By keeping Lafayette, Ind., the “center of my universe,” despite 22 years in Washington, D.C. Lamb, 51, grew up in Lafayette a C

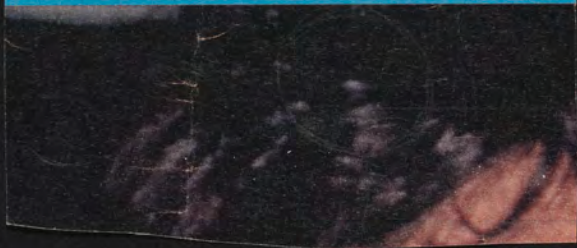
