I enjoy almost everything on it, including your "Booknotes" program and your reporters' roundup shows. The contributions that C-SPAN makes to public debate are immeasurable. On very many occasions I have considered your coverage of events and your choice of commentators to be judicious and fair. But it does seem to me that speakers or reporters commonly have either a right-wing bias or that they lean over backwards

to criticize the Clinton administration. Free speech is a glorious thing, but you have surely afforded great gobs of it to the likes of Dornan, Limbaugh, and Brock.

And this brings me to a present complaint. I have been trying all weekend to catch a repeat airing of H. R. Clinton's press conference of last Friday so that I might record it on my VCR.
