HOW BIG IS THE FAMILY TREE?

CC The descendants of those who came to America on the *Mayflower* probably now include more than three million Chinese in China, Hindus in India, and blacks in Africa — not to mention several million Americans and Europeans. Here's why . . .

□ ALTHOUGH FEW OF HIS MEMBERS seem to realize it, man's relation to himself is fairly easy to measure and is surprisingly close. In fact, no human being (of any race) can be less closely related to any other human than approximately fiftieth cousin, and most of us (no matter what color our neighbors) are a lot closer. Indeed this low magnitude for the lineal compass of mankind is accepted by the leading geneticists I have consulted (from J. B. S. Haldane to Theodosius Dobzhansky to Sir Julian Huxley), and it means simply that the family trees of all of us, of whatever origin or trait, must meet and merge into one genetic tree of all humanity by the time they have spread into our ancestries for about fifty generations. This is not a particularly abstruse fact, for simple arithmetic demonstrates that, if we double the number of our ancestors for each generation as we reckon backward (consistently multiplying them by two: 2 parents, 4 grandparents, 8 great-grandparents, 16 great-great-grandparents, etc.), our personal pedigree would cover mankind before the thirtieth generation. Mathematics is quite explosive in this regard, you see, for the thirtieth power of two (1,073,741,824) turns out to be much larger than was the earth's population 30 generations ago — that is, in the thirteenth century, if we assume 25 years to a generation.

But you cannot reasonably go on doubling your ancestors for more than a very few generations into the

past because inevitably the same ancestor will appear on both your father's and your mother's sides of your family tree, reducing the total number (since you can't count the same person twice), and this must happen more and more as you go back in time. The basic reason it happens is that spouses are not just spouses but they are also cousins (although the relationship is usually too distant to be noticed), which means they are related to each other not only by marriage but also by "blood" because somewhere in the past they share ancestors. Another way of saying it is that your father's family tree and your mother's inevitably overlap, intertwine and become one tree as their generations branch out backward, a process forced by geometry until eventually all your ancestors are playing double, triple, quadruple and higher-multiple roles as both sides, all quarters, eighths, etc., of your tree finally merge with others into one common whole and the broad tops of the family trees of everyone alive and his family become identical with their ancestral world populations. These populations of course are the fertile portions of past societies and naturally cannot include "old maids," cautious bachelors, or anyone who fails to beget at least one continuous line of fecund descendants to disseminate his genes into mankind's future.

If people all over the earth always married at random, choosing their mates by lot regardless of what coun-

"How to Get the Most Value for Your Meat Dollar"

First Prize: Serve smaller portions of meat and more vegetables. Buy cheaper cuts and tenderize them by braising or stewing. Watch for weekend specials and plan your meals around them. Small quantities of thinly sliced meat, quickly stir-fried with fresh vegetables, served over steamed brown rice or millet makes a delicious dinner. . . . Around March I purchase a calf, a piglet, and a mess of chickens. By the following winter I have enough meat to last me for the coming year. . . . *Bruce Roberts, Jackson, Michigan*

. . . In the chain store where I trade, meat not sold by the end of the day is remarked to sell the following morning at 20 to 25 percent less. . . . *Mrs. Kenneth A. Brooks, Leicester, Massachusetts*

. . . Serve inexpensive combinations of beans and wheat, or cereal grains and dairy products — foods which alone are incomplete, yet when combined form complete proteins. Use a cookbook devoted to high-protein, meatless cooking. . . . *Marla Precht, Sulphur Springs, Arkansas*

. . . Cook meat slowly. It shrinks less. . . . *Mrs. S. D. Goodwin, Mattoon, Illinois*

. . . Plan menus, allowing 4-6 ounces of meat per person. Serve in the kitchen, eliminating temptations for seconds. Start dinner with a cup of soup. Hot breads are filling. . . . *Hilda Van Valkenburg, Walden, Colorado*

. . . I may put extra bowls of beans, vegetables, slaw, etc., on the table for "seconds," but the meat, chicken, fish, etc., items are rationed out. . . . *Mrs. Olive Tonnsen, St. Louis, Missouri*

. . . The best meat stretcher I know of is turkey. You stuff and roast it for a meal, then slice leftover meat for sandwiches. Use small pieces for turkey a la king on toast. Use remainder, bones and all, for soup. . . . *Violet Finzel, Grantsville, Maryland*

marriage. In rural tropical Africa, for example, the average tribesman is expected to marry inside his tribe of perhaps ten thousand people yet outside his family clan of one or two thousand, giving him a total population of some eight thousand to pick from.

In a few rare cases tribal members have been even more restricted endogamically, as in the inbred clan called Foldi in the Hyabites tribe of Arabia, all of whose people have six toes on each foot and five fingers plus thumb on each hand and who have come to value their 24 digits so highly that they will kill any 20-digit baby born to them as the illegitimate issue of an adulterous mother. The same goes for the monkey-tailed clan of Kali who traditionally refuse to keep any infant who doesn't have a tail.

Laws of exogamy, on the other hand, can be at least as extreme in the opposite (outward) direction and the marriage law in much of western Europe during the time of the Crusades defined incest as extending out to fifth cousins. In some other parts of the world the outbreeding groups were even larger, as in imperial China, where one was forbidden to wed anyone with the same family name, a rule that diverted the average Chinese bridegroom away from about a million of his closer relatives and undoubtedly contributed much to the homogeneity of that most populous nation.

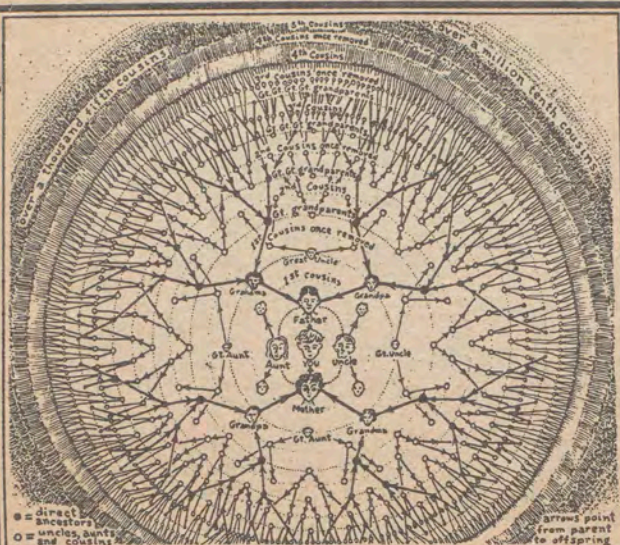
It is practically impossible to set limits on where any man's family connections may reach upon the habitable earth. And the very proliferation and complexity of his relations is incomprehensible to most of us for, even if you assume only two children to a couple (a quota actually too low to permit humanity to survive), everyone on the average must have 4 first cousins (the children of

his uncles and aunts), 16 second cousins (the grandchildren of his great-uncles and great-aunts), probably 64 third cousins, about 250 fourth cousins, roughly 1,000 fifth cousins and some million relatives as close as tenth cousin. Then, if you extrapolate on into the billions, which means extending your relatives to all humanity, it is evident that, even after allowing liberally for the shared ancestry of spouses and all the barriers to intertribal and intercontinental marriages, the range of fiftieth cousins will still easily cover the planet.

Of course a few snobbish people will protest, "But my family is an exception. We traced our ancestry back eleven hundred years and they all came from an isolated community on the Isle of Man where they spoke Manx and never had any marriage contact with the outside world."

Statements of that sort cannot possibly stand up to close scrutiny. Genealogists, I admit, will often trace a prominent family name back for hundreds of years — which involves only the relatively simple procedure of following one male line of descent. But the average person has approximately a million ancestors with some thousand names just in the last 500 years, and it is patently impossible to trace any large portion of them. Even such a well-publicized lineage as the *Mayflower* descendants from Plymouth, Massachusetts, can hardly begin to track down their relatives of 350 years, and a little knowledge of early Yankee seamanship and fecundity in the tea and slave ports of Asia and Africa, plus mathematics, will show that their ranks probably now include more than a million Chinese in China, a comparable number of Hindus in India and blacks in Africa — not to mention several million Americans and Europeans. ■ ■

try, race, class, or religion they came from, it would take something like 35 to 40 generations for all their family trees thus to merge completely in common ancestors, the time beyond 30 generations needed because of the aforementioned slowdown in backward ancestral multiplication, a rate which progressively decreases from two to one and ultimately even below one when the family trees begin to encompass all humankind, whose numbers of course were smaller in earlier centuries. But obviously people do not mate at random, for there have always been barriers to boys and girls getting together: oceans, high mountains, and vast distances between them; rigid marriage laws, religious sex taboos, and innumerable racial and cultural prejudices. On the other hand, there have been almost as many compensating influences tending to overcome these barriers and increase the scope of mating: long hunting trips for food, nomadic herding, expeditions for

business or war with its spoils in slaves and women; also strict laws against incest and inbreeding, all naturally abetted by man's primordial appetite for novel amorous adventure.

Probably most significant of these factors, geneticists agree, are the nearly universal rules of endogamy (inbreeding) and exogamy (outbreeding) that respectively permit marrying persons to pick each other only from *inside* the membership of a specified larger, endogamous social group (such as a tribe or caste) yet also only from *outside* a specified smaller exogamous group (like a clan). In many sophisticated countries today of course the endogamous group is nothing less than mankind and the exogamous group is one's own immediate family, which gives a man latitude to propose to practically any uncommitted female in the wide spectrum between his niece and a chimpanzee. But virtually all the more primitive of human societies have traditions that greatly restrict

JULY, THE SEVENTH MONTH

The Milky Way, that faint, luminous band of distant stars, is becoming visible in the early evening now. The dark rift that appears to split the Milky Way in two is caused by huge clouds of cosmic dust that obscure the light of the stars behind them. Only the occultation of Jupiter by the moon on the 15th will be visible (about 10 P.M.) from the lower 48 states, although Alaskans can glimpse the occultation of Saturn on the 17th at 2 A.M. July 4th is the day in 1776 that Congress approved the Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was first published on July 6, first read publicly on July 8, and first ordered "to be fairly engrossed on parchment" on July 19 — so we could legitimately celebrate for half the month! St. Swithin (the 15th) was a faithful adviser to the West Saxon kings Egbert and Ethelwulf in the 9th century. According to an old rhyme, "St. Swithin's day, if thou be fair, for forty days 'twill rain nae mair."

Farmer's Calendar

June is the Moon of Strawberries. Time your garden activities by the coming of black-eyed Susans, butterflyweed and the blue of wild chicory. Moss and sorrel in lawns usually mean poor soil, lack of aeration or drainage, or excessive acidity. Correct them.

The tenderest of vegetables, tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, etc., can now be set out safely the first of the month even in southern Canada, if not already planted. Mulch to preserve moisture, prevent blossom end rot and splitting.

Shade trees pruned now callous over quickly.

Break seed capsules off rhododendrons, laurel, lilacs and azaleas promptly for better blooming next year.

The dropping of small fruits from your trees is normal, if it is not excessive. This is the "June drop."

Divide and replant iris after flowering is past, if crowded.

Mulch strawberries with hay or straw to keep the berries off the ground. Root runners for a new bed.

Spray glads for thrips until the color shows.

In the North and Midwest sow beans, beets, carrots, kohlrabi, turnips and greens for a later crop. It is not too late to also sow such quick-growing annuals as portulacas, alyssum, cornflowers, Shirley poppies, etc.

In the South, California and Southwest discard tulips after blooming. It is necessary to plant new cold-treated bulbs each year for flowers.

Pacific Northwest gardeners feed hollies for a good crop of berries.

In the Mountain and High Plains States, especially, do not surface water. Soak deeply. Trees may need watering with root feeders.

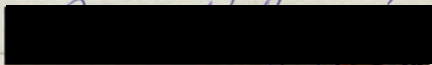

Vegas pilot relives miracle flight

Training to "keep cool" and 31 years of flying experience helped pilot H.G. "Hoot" Gibson, who saved 87 lives by pulling a tailspinning TWA airliner out of a death dive.

Fatigued from only three hours sleep in 48 hours, Gibson said: "I feel like I'm 400 years old."

"Sure, everybody thinks about it," he told the Associated Press Friday night in an interview at his Las Vegas home.

"Things like that happen. But the people I work with have their act together. From the start, we (pilots) have been taught to keep cool...hold up under the worst."

His harrowing rescue came Wednesday night over Michigan when the Boeing 727 — on a New York-to-Minneapolis flight — went into a barrel roll at 39,000 feet. Breaking the sound barrier during a five-mile plunge, the airliner pulled out "maybe two seconds before crashing," according to a source who asked not to be identified.

"It seemed like it lasted 20 seconds," said Gibson, a veteran of 16 years with TWA.

"People say pilots are overpaid. The reason we get good money is for those critical few seconds every 4-5 years. You can't put a price on that,"

said Gibson, 44, who keeps in shape by jogging up to seven miles a day.

Gibson declined to cite specifics of the ordeal Wednesday night until TWA completes an investigation.

His thoughts varied as the plane thundered groundward.

"I didn't have time to talk to The

Man, but we could have held a group prayer session at the end," he said.

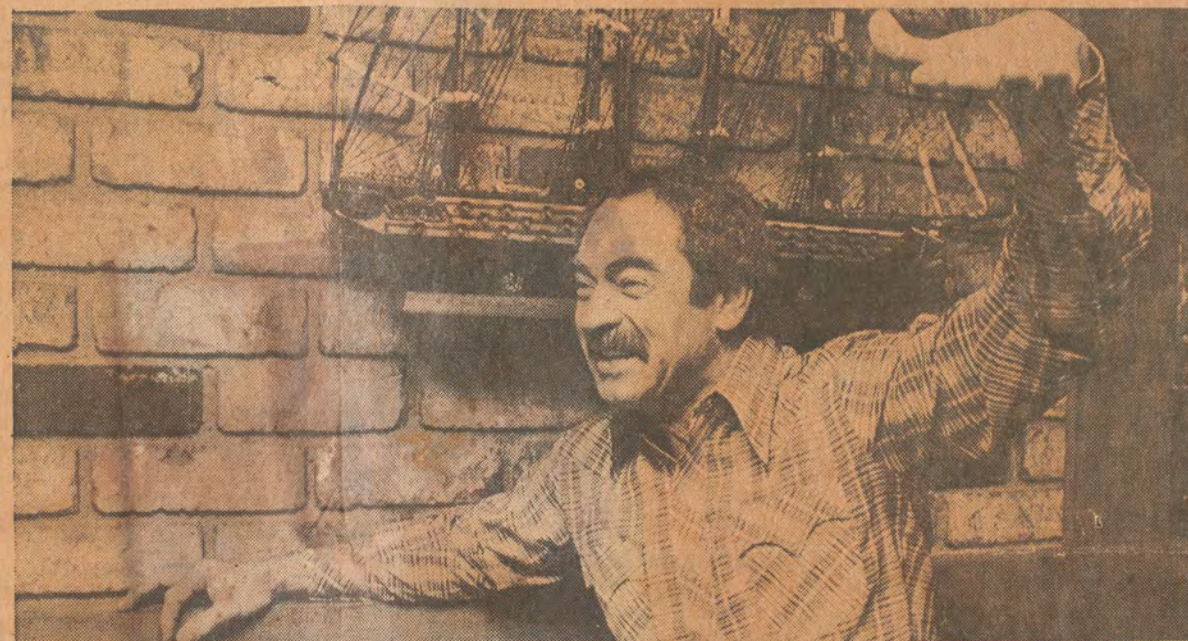
Keeping with company policy, he would not discuss why he resorted to putting down the landing gear — a move that brought the plane out of the dive.

"It comes down to doing the right

thing at the right time," he said.

Since the near-disaster, he said the phone has rung off his wall.

"I've had calls from all over the country — and I've got an unlisted phone number. Somebody from Hollywood called and wants the rights for a movie."

CETA funds slashed

A dispute over a repayment plan for \$17,000 has resulted in the U.S. Labor Department cutting off millions of dollars from the local CETA group.

The Las Vegas-Clark County Comprehensive Employment and Training Act Consortia still will be able to get funds from the Labor Department, but it now will be more difficult, said Las Vegas City Commissioner Ron Lurie, who is chairman of the local CETA executive board.

What the Labor Department did was pull the letter of credit of the local CETA group. Lurie explained the letter of credit is like a bank account against which CETA draws its funds.

Without the letter of credit, the city of Las Vegas, which is the prime sponsor of the local CETA branch, will have to pay out money for CETA and then bill the Labor Department for reimbursement, Lurie said Friday.

The commissioner said the situation annoys him not only because it means more paperwork, but also because it is another example of federal intervention.

Casino spokesmen seek to weaken Tahoe bill

CARSON CITY (AP) — Lake Tahoe Basin casinos presented their own brash version of a bistate compact in amendments Friday which would greatly weaken growth controls at the lake.

Appearing before an almost unnoticed subcommittee of the Assembly Government Affairs Committee, attorneys for major basin casinos said AB503 should be amended to protect them from future and existing lawsuits and to weaken proposed growth controls.

Committee Chairman Joe Dini, D-Yerington, estimated that only about 10 percent of the casino-suggested amendments would be incorporated in AB503. But he said the casinos had made constructive suggestions.

Dini hopes to bring AB503 to the Assembly for a vote next week. The bill, proposed by an ad hoc Nevada legislative committee, would overhaul the existing Tahoe Regional Planning Agency which has been severely criticized by California officials.

A more restrictive bill is now before the California Assembly. Any new compact would have to be approved by both states and Congress.

List urges state support of Carter's energy plan

CARSON CITY — Gov. Robert List expressed support Friday of President Carter's energy-saving program as he urged Nevadans to "meet or even exceed" the president's guidelines.

"That includes adhering to the 55 mph speed limit and filling up gas tanks during the week so there is enough for the tourists on the weekend," List told 300 teen-agers attending the annual Governor's Youth Conference.

List warned the crowd Carter may close stations on weekends unless voluntary conservation measures are successful.

"Weekend closures are something we simply cannot accept. The consequences are unthinkable. Unemployment will skyrocket, taxable revenues will plunge and our state's economy will be thrown into

chaos," List said.

But the president has given states a chance to prove themselves, List said.

Nevadans must sacrifice, the governor said. Driving 15 miles less a week, as the president requested in his address, is not unreasonable, List said.

List added that deregulation of oil may provoke petroleum companies to look further for oil in Nevada.

"We have only limited known sources of crude oil, specifically the oil fields in Nye County," List said. "Our state imports some 5 percent of the energy we consume which leaves us in a particularly vulnerable position."

The governor said the state has begun work on a energy-savings program of its own.

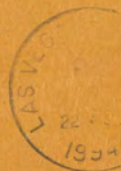

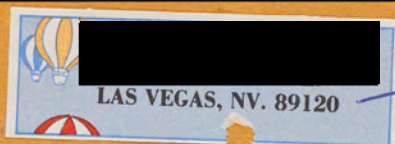
