Over the course of my coaching career, I visualize myself using the example of Michael Menser and the Batesville Bulldogs as a model to emulate. Today in Batesville and in other southeastern Indiana communities, there is a young guard working on his game in his backyard so he can someday play like Michael Menser.

Parts of Indiana seem fixed in time: a solitary farmboy with a buzz haircut shooting a basketball at a milk carton affixed to a pole, a South Side Indy kid lifting high off the macadam in a serious pickup game. Many days, near dusk, a CSX freight still rumbles slowly through Milan, past the water tower painted in tribute to the 1954 state high school basketball champions. And yet many Hoosiers say their game may never be the same.

Change has swept through Indiana and taken with it one of the state's best-loved traditions. The realization that single-class basketball and its tournament have vanished is a truth better known after spending a season in Indiana. Batesville coach Melvin Siefert says, "I hope that somehow we can get back to the old way."

Until then, Hoosiers still will fill the gyms and Indiana kids will keep shooting basketballs, and ultimately some still will become legends. Unswervingly positive, Hoosiers may be content knowing they're on the side of the angels and their sainted spokesman for basketball, John Wooden, Martinsville High, class of '28. In Indiana he's still called Johnny.

"Although there is no progress without change, all change is not progress," Wooden said. "A change to class basketball in Indiana high school tournament play would not be progress. More doesn't mean better. Nor does bigger. The Indiana state basketball tournament is easily the equivalent of the NCAA tournament and is more highly regarded than the tournaments in any other state.
