Thank you for sharing your concerns with me regarding Native Americans on Indian Affairs additional \$1 billion request.

Historically, Congress has administered programs, including education, job training, health, housing, and law enforcement assistance, to Native Americans both on and off reservations. The President in his 1991 budget proposal requested \$2.5 billion for Indian Health Services, Bureau of Indian Affairs, education, housing, and the Administration for Native Americans in the Department of Health and Human Services. In this year's proposed budget, emphasis has been placed on education on the reservations with \$234 million proposed for education funding. In 1990, the federal government spent \$2.8 billion for Indian programs administered through government and tribal agencies.

Although much has been done to alleviate unemployment, alcoholism, and other obstacles to prosperity on Indian reservations, problems remain. The Senate Select Committee on Indians Affairs continues to investigate charges of inefficient implementation of federal programs by the Bureau of Indian Affairs and allegations of corruption in some tribal governments.

Please be assured that I share your concerns for the fair and ethical treatment of Native Americans and will have your thoughts in mind as the Senate consider legislation to fund Indian programs.
