"AMERICAN PROFILES" FEATURES SEN. NUNN AND GEN. POWELL: SHAPING U.S. DEFENSE STRATEGY

Washington, D.C., April 16, 1992 -- C-SPAN's signature,"American Profiles" program features two policymakers in Washington on this week's two-hour program. Sen. Sam Nunn (D-GA), Chairman, Senate Armed Services Committee and General Colin Powell, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, will discuss their lives, careers and families in an in-depth, candid interview.

C-SPAN will air "American Profiles" on Monday, April 20, at 8:00 PM (ET)/5:00 PM (PT). The two interviews air in alphabetical order.

Sam Nunn will discuss his Georgia upbringing, his family, his interest in sports, his enlistment in the Coast Guard and his decision to enter law school. He is a four-term senator who was first elected to the Senate in 1972. Sen. Nunn will also talk about how he first came to Washington to work for his great-uncle, Carl Vinson, who was chairman of the House Armed Services Committee.



POWELL, NUNN PROFILED

Gen. Colin Powell, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and Sen. Sam Nunn (D-Ga.), chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, are working from both sides of the Po-

tomac to shape American defense strategy.

This week the two discuss their lives, careers and the people and experiences that shaped their views in separate editions of American Profile on C-SPAN. The hour-long interview with Nunn airs at 8 pm



As chairman of the Joint Chiefs, Gen, Powell helped plan last year's military operations in the Persian Gulf — Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm. He entered the Army as an ROTC student at the City College of New York. He served two tours of duty in Vietnam.

During the interview he discusses his interest in the military and why he has turned down offers to enter the private sector received partly in response to his Gulf War fame. "I have never found any line of work that appealed to me more than being a soldier," he says.

He also discusses his early academic career, which he describes as mediocre, the people he met in Washington as a White House fellow and how they affected his career, and the influence of his parents and growing up in Harlem and the South Bronx.

Sen. Nunn also reviews the influences of his upbringing in rural Georgia. The fourterm senator, who won his first Senate election in 1972, grew up in Perry, Ga. He discusses his family, his interest in sports (he

went to Georgia Tech to play basketball), his enlistment in the Coast Guard, and his decision to enter law school.

He also talks about how he first came to Washington to work for his great-uncle, Carl Vinson, who chaired the

his great-uncle, Carl Vin son, who chaired the House Armed Services

Committee. He compares his views on American defense to his uncle's, including his belief that a strong defense is necessary to prevent war but that military action should only be the last resort for resolving differences. The senator supported American deployment of troops to the Persian Gulf when Iraq invaded Kuwait, but he opposed President Bush's January 1991 decision to use military force to expel Iraqi troops.
