Swain: Vanity Fair did a profile of you this month . . .

Bush: I thought it was very hurtful.

Swain: Did you? Why?

Bush: Well, because I thought it twisted things. I've had more letters from friends saying, "I didn't say that, I'm so sorry". And you know, I understood because I'm misquoted just like anybody else. And I understood that I felt sorry for them. I felt a little bit sorrier for me. It was very mean.

But anyway, so be it. I don't know the writer. Never met her. It was just too bad. But that's life. That's what happens when you get into politics.

And I don't think it was at me. I'm going to tell you the honest truth. I really think it was to pull George Bush down. Not me. I don't mean that to sound arrogant. I don't think I'm important enough to write an article about. But I think anything to hurt George is fair play these days.

Swain: Why, do you think?

Bush: Oh, because he's running for president. I think that's what happens and I think it's too bad that everyone who runs for president is subjected to some very ugly things.

Swain: You've been in politics a long time. Is that a change in the way politics is run in this country?

Bush: Getting worse. Getting worse, I think. I mean, when you attack children and . . . I think it's getting worse. It's too bad, but that doesn't mean you're going to get out of politics -- 'cause we're not.

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
