### The C-SPAN Networks

In 1979, C-SPAN was created by the cable television industry to provide live gavel-to-gavel coverage of the U.S. House of Representatives. Today, in addition to the live House proceedings, C-SPAN offers a front row seat to other public affairs events from the nation's capital and across the country. On any given day C-SPAN crews cover between five and fifteen events.

The cable industry created **C-SPAN II** in 1986 to cablecast the live sessions of the U.S. Senate, in their entirety. C-SPAN II's round-the-clock programming complements the original C-SPAN network by offering more viewing alternatives to cable TV audiences interested in public affairs programming.
