Hay never comfortable with  
power or leadership

met Lincoln while prac. law  
Nicolay (Bavarian - 6'6" old, jowly)  
made Sec. to A.L. - hired Hay as an  
assistant - May 22

Sent by Dewey to be No. 2 in Paris - get away from Mary Todd  
US did not create rank of Capt until 1893

Foreign service officer for 5 yrs. - Vienna / Madrid / France until 10'  
hated monarcy - loved being a republican  
4 1/2 yrs. writing editorials for Greek's Tribune  
5 ft 2 ins. Marriage to Clara Stone<sup>(24)</sup> moved to Cleveland (35 yrs old)  
father-in-law commits suicide after accident alights feet &  
goes to Europe summer whole year 82 - Neuralgia  
Nov 86 - Arrangement of Lewis' book for 4 yrs.  
from 86-91 - he was unemployed - traps - then Amb to London  
affair with Nannie Lodge - wife of Henry Calot

Alfred T. Mahan - anti imperialist -  
outspoken against Navy corruption - liked a Big Navy - 700 ships  
during Civil War -  
acting Pres. of War College 86' - new school a lot in Navy didn't like it  
invites TR to lecture - starts a life long alliance bet. the two for Big Navy  
wrote books - laid out why U.S. needed great navy to be a world power  
modern historians say "The Influence of Sea Power Upon History" was not  
original or wholly accurate. TR read it - gave it rave review.  
born 1840 at West Point - went Naval Acad. grad at 18 left imm.  
Spent years at sea in Japan / Phillipines through Suez Canal -  
Married Ellen Evans June 11, 1872 - began Acad at 18  
1890-1914 - he wrote 130 articles  
1892 - Became Pres of War College  
He was ordered by his every ramsey to sea. Command of USS Chicago  
daughter Ellen / Helen - son Fred  
had to retire from Navy 1896 - relied heavily on Christianity  
3 friends Ashby, Tuck, Geo. Douglas  
Compared to Geo. Kennan - father of doctrine - for Mahan -  
greatest contribution - writer  
Sea Power

T.R. -

Mother from Georgia

Civil War - Father 29 Teedie 2 | Father hired substitutes  
as did his 4 brothers - as did James G. Blaine - G. Cleveland.  
P 192

went to Howard - bunch of eccentricities - discarded clothes  
powder puff writers - wrote anti-slavery letters to Corinne  
allow \$8000 a year. 5 ft 8" 130 lbs

father died Sept. 4. - gradeshooting

wrote Naval Day of 1882 when he was 23

1881 - State Assembly ~ 3 terms

Wife [mother] died on FEB 14, 1884 - He was 25 - widower, orphan  
and father

83-87 - spent a total of 2 yrs. in Medora, N.D.

Married Edith Carow in London

86 son for Mayors come in 3rd

Harrison nominated for Civil Service Commission - stayed  
6 years - he was 30 when moved in Henry Adams' circle  
got to know John Hay who found TR too ambitious and pushy -  
1887 - Mahan invited him to Naval War College to speak  
Police Commissioner - 1895

Called Indians savages etc. Latin Dagoes

1897 - 1st. Sec. of Navy

Expansionist U.S. (1) War of Independence  
(2) L.A. Purchase  
(3) T.R.A. purchase of Fla. from Spain  
(4) Moral Doctrines - 4 No's. (P1B)

Next to Jeff-Polk greatest expansionist Pres.

U.S. Senate - Council on Foreign Relations - Carnegie Endowment  
few enemies / sense of humor / idealistic / liberal Republicans  
Entered Hamilton College New York at 15

Law Degree - NYU — later '71 represented Boss Tweed  
joined Union League Club - Married Clara Wales 1878

as a lawyer - ambition but not greed  
friend of Chester A. Arthur - with him when Garfield killed  
supported T.R. for state assembly 1881 / He became U.S. attorney  
for southern district of N.Y. (Arthur)  
became leader of D.O.P. in N.Y.C.

He was not a populist but could bite hand that feeds him. P139  
at constitutional convention spoke about politicians being hand  
minders for insurance companies etc.

He was a stalwart.

Husband Clara was social Root's was not - 13 yrs. older than T.R.  
he had sympathy for Blacks but was against women's right to vote  
he opposed direct election of Senate

McK asked Root to be Sec War because he wanted a ~~longer~~ longer  
to be able to set governments in Phil and P.R. and Cuba

When American Soldiers committed atrocities against Phil  
he thought his duty to cover it up. p 148

Lodge -

3 terms in U.S. House 1892 Freshman in Senate - he remained for 30 years

1895 - speech about Hawaii and need for strong Navy as per Mahan's sea power thesis - he supported Mahan in dispute with senior officer but had never met him Point man: for American imperialism "commerce follows the flag"

Battleships: Bvtans 50 U.S. - 3

Only son - lived around 4 great historians Bancroft et. al.  
Whit at Harvard engaged to Nannie Davis - married June 1871  
His teacher Henry Adams tells him to make it pay (P159)  
at 26 - law degree and doctorate from Harvard

He wrote 27 books - taught at H. for 4 years.  
liberal agenda - rarely met poor - anti-slavery - believed in  
superiority of his kind - a prig - a snob

Wanton Lodge's political addl

Lodge voted for Tilden (a reformer) in 76  
He lost election Congress in 84 because of Magawamps - (reformers)  
T. P. and Lodge became close over opposition to Blaine in 84  
Lodge (8 yrs. older) than T. P. - T. P. closest close friend  
Lodge went for but with McKinley for T. R.'s assist sec of Navy job  
L and McKinley sat next to each other in House -  
L: cold, ruthless and bigoted. - overweening, overbearing,  
self confidence

M.C. on what to do with the peace P 320 -

Check applause motion to speaker in Midwest  
during Oct 1898 elections

Treaty of Paris - 17 articles - signed by 5 on each side Dec 10  
American showed no mercy on Spanish  
final tally 61-29

Anti Imperialist League - Carnegie / Twain - Northeastern  
Godkin - Irish immigrant - Carl Schurz - Prussian immigrant at 23

T.R. joins Army - father's failure to fight in Civil War.  
Made Lt. Col. - Leonard Wood - M.C. Doctor to command unit.

Rough Riders - from Howard to N.M. - Graham  
Tampa - 48 vessels, 16,000 men embark for Cuba.

First Great Triumph - world movement PZ75

Naval Blockade in Santiago Bay Cuba

T.R. land at Daiquiri - lost 8 Rough Riders - first  
American killed Hamilton Fish, grandson of Sec. State

R. Riders - supporting role in taking San Juan Hill - T.R.  
Shoots one Spaniard (kills him) 150,000 Spanish soldiers - 15,000  
American sent into battle -

T.R. a hero but shameless promoter

Spanish-American War - most popular war in American history

July 6, 1898 - Lodge get 42-21 vote to Annex Hawaii  
Capt Cook set foot in 1778 - eventually killed and eaten by  
Polynesians - Hawaii - sugar boom - in 1872 leased  
Carl Hoan to U.S. for Navy Port

In Hawaii Americans threatened Human Rights unlike in  
Iowa.

Grover Cleveland - didn't want annexation

Surrender of Santiago July 17

In Cuba Rebels were scorned by U.S. soldiers - all black

It is a great historical expedition, and I thrill to feel that I am part of it. If we fail, of course we share the fate of all who do fail, but if we are allowed to succeed (for we certainly shall succeed, if allowed) we have scored the first great triumph in what will be a world movement.

—Lieutenant Colonel Theodore Roosevelt to his sister Corinne from the troopship *Yucatan* bound for Cuba, June 15, 1898

Cuba —

T. R. required letters to get U.S. soldiers out of Cuba because of malaria - leaked letter to A.P. - campaign to get Medal of Honor. Got his fellow officers to write letters citing his bravery. 1913 - published them in his diary Clinton awarded T.R. medal Jan 2001 p 298  
1,014 American killed in Cuba 1/3 1/4's by disease

Guam - June 20 - fire on Island - thinks it a salute but eventually surrenders - makes 2nd overseas colony after Wardway

Manila - troops same on Spanish and American sides P305  
Aguinaldo - leader of insurgent wanted independence 3,000  
American and Spanish pretended to fight American raised flag on Aug 13  
no battle fought for Santiago / Havana / Manila -  
still insurgents treated battle referred to as Mugigao by U.S. -

Sherman / Serials / McLennan to John Hay as See Note

Jingoes and Goo-goo's

Treaty of Paris - U.S. / Spanish agreement

Jug - T.R. / Lodge / Mahan

Panama Canal - negotiated with Colombia  
T.R. Prior nationalization or throwing out Colombian  
money to Rep W. Cora from William Crouseell \$1,60,000

1906 - 1st trip of U.S. Pres. outside country - to Panama  
10 million to Panama - 40 million to Banana Verilla  
Co.

T.R. considered Hay to be soft

Panamanian Revolution - aided by U.S.

T.R. - Canal - most important achievement of his Presidency

Germans in St. Thomas and Venezuela -  
Roosevelt Corollary and The Monroe Doctrine - p 441  
authorized American intervention in Latin America

Cuban crisis 1906 - U.S. sends in Maine  
T.R. makes Charles Magoon in charge - country back to  
Cuban in 1909

T.R. leaves successors - principle of intervention

Open Doors to China 1900 - 500 American troops - Boers  
out of Hay's 2 great contributions - the other P. G. B.  
he should get credit for opening Asia, the great trade that  
we have today.

During 1st decade of 20th C. - 9 million immigrants lead to  
xenophobia

Howard etc - anti immigrant - anti non anglo-saxons

Henry Cabot Lodge - most restrictive on immigration  
Immigration Restriction League


TR - mixed on race and immigration
