





I am sure that if we all work together we can work this out and convict them, pat ourselves on the back for a good job well done, and justice will be served.

Oh, I forgot about the jury in this case, something must be done with them. We can't allow these racial bigots, which all the people are calling them, to go uncleansed. You will need to get out the cultural hoods and robes and burn them on a cross to appease the leaders across our nation that we will handle these corrupt citizens.

As ridiculous as that sounds, this is the way of the Ku Klux Klan and organizations like them. But now you say it's alright for us to do it because we represent the law, and we surely want to show our moral values to our grandchildren, don't we sir.
