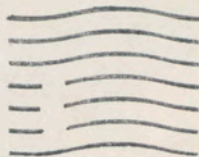
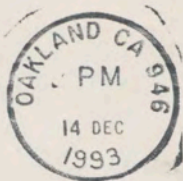
why you never came back with any questions about Louis Martin.
