Dear Mr. Lamb:

C-Span, beyond doubt, is the best that television offers the people of the entire world, as well as the United States particularly, in the area of public affairs. I am one of millions who values and appreciates your programs. I hope you go on forever.

I would like to suggest two possibilities for future programs, one or both of which might be most suitable for interviews or your panel discussion groups.

Congressman Henry Gonzalez of Texas is, in my opinion, the very best person, in either house of Congress, to clarify, explain, and interpret the banking and fiscal problems of all the money-holding institutions in the country. He is, for me, the only one who has a greatly enriched knowledge of the banking industry and the history of government's involvement with it. His presentations are unenrolled in convoluted thought. He is so simply clear and lucid without being unfocused. I know you have had other Senators and Congressmen whom you have interviewed, and possibly you have had Congressman Gonzalez whom I missed. However, he is the gentleman who is, to me, so outstanding he deserves more than one appearance.

A second possibility for C-Span's producers which I would

value would be a program or two on the secret organizations and/or Committees the Bush (and possibly Reagan) administration has in operation. Two of these I mention specifically are the Committee on Competitive Business (or of similar name) which is headed by Vice President Quayle, which grants immunity to large corporations from regulation of disposal of hazardous byproducts and polluting wastes. This has recently been made public. Another area of interest is the secret government headed by Oliver North ^{and Quayle} which is "in place" in the form of underground bunkers and very sophisticated communication systems which would be used by high governmental and military people in case of nuclear war. It has recently been revealed (of limited exposure) how this is budgeted at the cost

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of billions without the knowledge of the public and, in particular, at the expense of almost unbelievable incompetence and mishandling. There is a name for this agency - something like Productive or Progressive Government (I may be way off on this title).

The thinking and caring people, and the people who have the time and stamina to want to stay informed as much as possible, would be well served, I believe, if C-Span would consider programs, panel discussions, or interviews with people who have some knowledge of these two areas.
