I watch C-SPAN because first, it is one of the few fair oases in the vast wasteland of television; second, because I believe every citizen has a responsibility to keep well-informed about the political goings-on within his country; and third, because what C-SPAN presents is not irritatingly interrupted by usually banal, often tasteless, and generally trivial "important messages" from sponsors hustling a gullible public.

Of these three reasons I believe the most important has to do with fulfilling one's responsibilities as a citizen to remain alert to political activities and affairs. Politics is the single science and art central almost without exception to everything that affects, shapes, and influences the human condition: health, education, welfare, the arts and sciences, the law, the professions, social relationships both at home and abroad, the economy--everything!

By focusing primarily on the American political scene C-SPAN supplies timely information essential to balanced citizen judgments and decisions based upon consideration and evaluation of views and opinions of diverse elements of the active political community. Commercial television fare, consisting mostly of low-grade entertainment, a surfeit of sports, and shallow, thin coverage of news events--including those political--has a place on the American scene, but it is a place whose emptiness just might go unnoticed. C-SPAN's place is one that Americans would be much deprived to have to do without.
