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C-SPAN CAMERAS LOOK AT THE ASSOCIATED PRESS NOVEMBER 17 - 21

Another in the Network's Behind the Scenes Looks at the News Media

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- C-SPAN cameras will take cable viewers behind the scenes at the Associated Press -- the largest news gathering organization in the world. For five consecutive days, beginning Monday, November 17, C-SPAN's morning call-in program originates from the Washington bureau of the Associated Press. Each day -- Monday, Tuesday, Friday, 8:15 - 11:00 am ET, and Wednesday, Thursday, 8:15 - 10:30 am ET -- C-SPAN viewers will meet some of the people who work for the A.P., which consists of over 302 news and photo bureaus worldwide. C-SPAN's call-in guests include: Charles Lewis, Washington Bureau Chief; James Hood, Deputy News Director, A.P. Broadcast Services; and Supreme Court Correspondent Richard Carelli.

Kicking off each morning's programming is a live, 15-minute conversation with an editor of one of A.P.'s member newspapers. Editors from papers as diverse as <a href="The Dallas">The Dallas</a>
<a href="Morning News">Morning News</a>, <a href="Arkansas Democrat">Arkansas Democrat</a>, <a href="The Boston Globe">The Boston Globe</a>, <a href="Traverse City Record-Eagle">Traverse City Record-Eagle</a>, and <a href="Sarasota Herald-Tribune">Sarasota Herald-Tribune</a> will talk about how they use the news service. Eighty-one percent of the nation's daily newspapers are members of the Associated Press, which was started in 1848 by a group of New York City newspapers.

Walter Mears, Executive Editor of the Associated Press, calls his organization a "dead center service that tells the news straight and objectively."

C-SPAN's week-long visit to the Associated Press is part of the network's continuing look at print media. Since its first "day in the life" program at the Los Angeles Times Washington bureau in 1981, C-SPAN has visited 20 news organizations, and 19 daily newspapers.

Nationally, C-SPAN can be seen in 25.5 million households, via 2,300 cable system affiliates.

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
