Dear Sir/Madam,

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The purpose of this letter is twofold. First, I would like to commend C-SPAN (& C-SPAN2) for its fair and unbiased coverage of this years Presidential Election. There are, unfortunately, few other sources that do not attempt, however subtly or "unintentionally" to present the candidates and the issues in a somewhat slanted view. C-SPAN has been unerring in its quest for balance, and this has been an aid to the democratic process ("democratic" with a small "d").

While I myself am a registered Republican (and one still loyal to the Party and the President), I think it is refreshing to hear speakers and callers who have opposing viewpoints. It invites a closer examination of why we hold our own opinions, and can only be healthy. You have provided a forum for every possible idea or ideal valuable to the political process, and by doing so in an even-handed fashion you have brought great credit to yourself and to the Cable Industry that finances you.

The second purpose of this correspondence is to suggest that you may wish to institute, of your own volition, a Presidential "Town-Hall" series, wherein callers may inquire of the President directly as was done recently in Richmond. I personally believe that despite public opinion polls suggesting otherwise, President Bush will be re-elected in November, and I think that this may be a forum for him to address the "Grid-Locked Congress" we have heard so much about. While its clear that Pres. Bush finds this format

personally distasteful, it is nevertheless the expressed will of the electorate that he (and all public officials) be more directly accountable to the electorate.

I hope you will present this idea to The White House irregardless of who sleeps there in January.
