BOOSE to buy everyday necessities.

Just weeks after the transfer, the commissioners discovered Sutherland's office had purchased an electric pencil sharpener for \$162 in July. Sutherland said the electric, industrial strength, commercial sharpener was purchased by a jail worker while he and jail administrator Virgil Valentine were on vacation.

After receiving the bill for the pencil sharpener, Commissioner Larry Silcox, a former county jail administrator, said he didn't think he would vote to approve additional funding for Sutherland until he saw a change in Sutherland's spending habits.

Tuesday, commissioners were given bills totaling about \$1,700 from Sutherland along with a letter advising them he didn't have enough money to

buy a new paper, pants to a jail clothes dryer and uniforms for corrections officers.

"Obviously some expenditures had to be made," said Elmlinger referring to the bills sent to the commissioners. "But when you get into expenditures — I hate to refer to the infamous pencil sharpener — but the commissioners don't have to transfer any more money. It's going to boil down to the commissioners and the sheriff sitting down and ironing this thing out and seeing where the money went. Then the commissioners will have to decide if they want to give him more money," said Elmlinger.

"Unless something is resolved, they're going to have the same problems in '99. You hate to tie a department head's hands too tightly, but the commissioners may have to really fine tune his budget," said Elm-

the option of detailing more closely how Sutherland can spend money by appropriating funds item by item.

"You hate to do that though; it creates a nightmare for everybody; the sheriff, the commissioners and the auditor's office. If they can't reach a compromise, that's ultimately what will have to happen though," Elmlinger said.

"I think it's a resolvable situation," Sutherland said yesterday. "I want to be part of the solution, not part of the problem," he added.

Sutherland said earlier this week he did not know what he would do if the commissioners did not approve more funding for his department.

The commissioners are expected to act on Sutherland's latest request at today's meeting, according to Mrs. Wilhelm.
