WASHINGTON, D.C.-- On September 16th, C-SPAN initiated changes in our programming schedule, morning call-in format, and the cable network's on-air look (see attached article.) C-SPAN wanted to alert you to these changes in our round-the-clock program schedule.

NTEW CALL-IN HOURS, some L changes in the "Morning Headlines" call-in format, and new typefaces make up C-SPAN's "new look," which the network inaugurated at 8:30 am edt Monday, September 16. Some of the differences are subtle. Some are not. But all of the changes are designed to alleviate problems associated with a national 24-hour-a-day public affairs network that anchors its schedule to the U.S. House of Representatives.

New Call-in Times

The most significant change is in the hours of the live call-in programs. The 9:00 am edt "Morning Headlines" program now begins at 8:30 am and runs for 90 minutes. The 5:00 pm edt program has been pushed back one hour to 6:00 pm, and the 9:00 pm edt program has been pushed back a half hour, to 9:30 pm.

According to Carrie Collins, C-SPAN's director of programming, the new "Morning Headlines" format combines two types of programs in one time period.

"People who want to talk about what's on the front pages of their newspapers and find out how the major papers covered the stories can tune in at 9:30. People who want to hear about one or two issues can tune in at 8:30," Collins said.

Collins thinks that the time changes for the two evening programs will allow more viewers in different time zones to participate; they may also reduce the number of programs that have to be canceled because of late-running House sessions.

"We will hit better time slots all across the country," Collins said.

The change in the 5:00 pm edt call-in is designed to accommodate the unpredictable length of House sessions. Often, House business or special orders sessions run past 5:00 pm edt. Too often in the past, when the call-in was scheduled at 5:00, it had to be canceled. Though there is no guarantee that the House will adjourn by 6:00 pm, the call-in will go on nevertheless, albeit a little later. If the guest can't wait for the House session to end, C-SPAN will open the phones and let the viewers talk about the day's House business. "We are now much more flexible," said Bruce Collins, C-SPAN vice president of network development. "In the old days, if the House ran past 5:00, we just canceled the show. Now, the viewer knows there will be a show." There are two reasons for the change of the 9:00 pm edt program. The first is logistic. Because the 5:00 pm program was pushed back, the 9:00 pm program also needed to be pushed back to leave enough time between the two programs to allow for programming of hearings or other events. The second and, to C-SPAN's West Coast viewers, more important reason is that the new time will make it more convenient for those viewers to watch the evening programs and to participate in the call-in. New Graphics

Some viewers may notice a change in the typefaces of the C-SPAN "supers" and "crawls" and in the credits at the end of programs. (Supers are words superimposed on the screen, such as the guest's name or "C-SPAN LIVE," and crawls are the information that occasionally runs along the bottom of the screen.) The C-SPAN LIVE super that used to appear in the upper-lefthand corner of the television screen now appears in a smaller typesize in the lowerleft-hand corner. TEW CALL-IN HOURS, some changes in the "Morning Headlines" call-in format, and new typefaces make up C-SPAN's "new look," which the network inaugurated at 8:30 am edt Monday, September 16. Some of the differences are subtle. Some are not. But all of the changes are designed to alleviate problems associated with a national 24-hour-a-day public affairs network that anchors its schedule to the U.S. House of Representatives.

New Call-in Times

The most significant change is in the hours of the live call-in programs. The 9:00 am edt "Morning Headlines" program now begins at 8:30 am and runs for 90 minutes. The 5:00 pm edt program has been pushed back one hour to 6:00 pm, and the 9:00 pm edt program has been pushed back a half hour, to 9:30 pm.

According to Carrie Collins, C-SPAN's director of programming, the new "Morning Headlines" format combines two types of programs in one time period.

"People who want to talk about what's on the front pages of their newspapers and find out how the major papers covered the stories can tune in at 9:30. People who want to hear about one or two issues can tune in at 8:30," Collins said.

Collins thinks that the time changes for the two evening programs will allow more viewers in different time zones to participate; they may also reduce the number of programs that have to be canceled because of late-running House sessions.
