- -- BALTIMORE/WASHINGTON AREA CABLE CO.s AGREE TO CARRY SENATE TELECASTS --
- -- Local Viewers to Have Greatest Access To Senate Channel -- C-SPAN II --

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- Beginning June 2nd, more than 300,000 cable television viewers in the Baltimore/Washington area will have access to the live proceedings of the U.S. Senate.

Nine cable companies in the Baltimore/Washington area have committed a channel
to C-SPAN II — providing live, uninterrupted coverage of the Senate floor proceedings — forming the largest concentration of C-SPAN II subscribers nationwide.

Across the country, some 120 cable systems have slated C-SPAN II for their program line-ups. This means that some 3 million households will have the opportunity to witness the opening of the Senate chamber to the scrutiny of television.

C-SPAN II's coverage of the U.S. Senate will enable cable viewers who live in the shadow of the nation's capital to have full coverage of both houses of Congress and a variety of other public affairs programs. Even "cable-less" Washington, D.C. — including the White House — will receive C-SPAN II through George Mason University's "Capitol Connection."

Congressional observers will have their eyes on the Senate telecasts when tax reform, an equally controversial issue, is taken-up for debate on the Senate floor. Senate leaders have announced that one of the first televised debates will focus on the highly-publicized income tax reform proposals.

C-SPAN plans a full menu of programming for the inaugural broadcast of Senate sessions that explores the nature of the Senate -- how it works, who the key players are, and the power of the Senate. On <u>June 2nd at noon, edt</u> and continuing until the Senate gavels in the first televised session, U.S. Senators, journalists, and experts on the Congress join C-SPAN for interviews -- live from the U.S. Capitol -- to discuss what viewers can expect to see in the weeks ahead.
