On Wednesday, November 6, Canadian House Speaker CEO Brian Lamb will flip a switch to bring C-SPAN coverage of the U.S. Congress into the offices of the Canadian parliament.

"It's a historic move for cable," says Brian Lamb. "Cable television is providing a permanent technological link between the legislative bodies of two governments. "

Lamb says that C-SBAN -- which is a privately-funded company -- plans to televise sessions from the Canadian House of Commons. In addition, viewers of the public affairs cable network will also see U.S. Congressmen link up by satellite with members of the Canadian parliament for interviews and live viewer call-in programs.

Ironically, the C-SPAN feed soon to be seen by the Canadian Parliament can not be watched by the members of the U.S. Congress. C-SPAN is not yet available on the internal Capitol Hill cable system.

Elsewhere, however, C-SPAN's round the clock programming can be seen by 22 million cable subscribers on 2,000 affiliated systems.
