FEDERAL CAMERAS IN THE COURTROOM EXPERIMENT DISCUSSED ON "AMERICA AND THE COURTS" THIS WEEKEND

Washington, D.C., Tuesday, December 21, 1993 -- The three-year experiment of television cameras in federal courtrooms around the country will end July 1, 1994, but the Judicial Conference's Ad Hoc Committee on Cameras in the Courtroom has recommended that the program be extended through the end of next year. The recommendation and a review of the experiment , which began in June 1991, are the subject of the next "America and the Courts" program on Christmas Day.

The program, which will air **Saturday**, **December 25**, **at 7 PM (ET)**, will feature a discussion and review of the three-year program and interviews with: Tony Mauro of USA Today and Fred Graham of Court TV, supporting cameras in the courtroom; Georgetown Law Center Professor Paul Rothstein, who is against the presence of cameras; and attorney Timothy Dyk, who helped to initiate the cameras in the courtroom experiment.
