REDHEAD DUCK
(*Aythya americana*)

Redhead ducks belong to the group of diving ducks, characterized by heavy bodies and short, set-back legs. Awkward on land, the ducks are perfectly suited for fast swimming and deep diving to snap-up their meal of aquatic plants from the muddy bottom. Males in their winter plumage exhibit the characteristic bright red head and an unusual blue bill with a black tip. Females are more subdued in coloring with a tawny brown plumage. Adults average between 18 and 22 inches long. The ducks breed in northeastern British Columbia to western Ontario and south to northern California. They migrate alone or in small flocks to points along the southern United States.
