Mr. Lamb:

I really enjoy your coverage and am a C-SPAN junkie. You have done more for VCR sales than any other factor. I really enjoy James Carville and Michael Barone and Sarah McLendon when they are on as guests.

But I believe you are overlooking one key area of American politics and that is the NAACP. There is a whole lot more to this great national organization than Benjamin Hooks. One of the most talented and charismatic NAACP leaders is their Texas president Gary Bledsoe. He is absolutely fearless and a person of absolute integrity.

Bledsoe shatters all stereotypical notions of an "NAACP lawyer." A West Texan by birth, he wears a White Stetson, cowboy boots, and a bolo tie. I have worked as a paid staffer for the past 25 years in many levels of the Democratic Party in Texas and I have never met a more intelligent person or one that was more unselfish.

The NAACP made a massive effort to get-out-the-vote in Texas. When C-SPAN was here in Texas last year there was no interest apparently in interviewing either Bledsoe or Garry Mauro, the state campaign chair for Clinton. These are the two finest political minds in the state. In basketball, you would call them the "go to" guys.


