OF "BEAT DAD MOMS"

In a couple of weeks I will observe my 75th birthday conveniently occurring ~~three days after the~~ historic 1920 election day. My mother, accompanied by a proud husband, cast her first vote then, as did the mothers of two of my husbands. This yearly exercise, repeated until their deaths, was often spoken of in our extended families.

As so charmingly related in a recent letter of the week, I, and my children after me, lived those *I remember Mama and Ozzie And Harriet* lives. "Those were the days," now "gone with the wind."

Family values were a covenant with both sexes respecting and supporting one another, the children of utmost importance.

Social mores have changed. Times have changed.

Matrimony has become a danger zone. Physical and emotional abuse is rampant. The children are the only innocent victims. They have become the canaries in the mine.

Inequitable and emasculating child support laws, greater and more repressive enforcement services and penalties in marital problems does nothing to solve a serious social problem. There is more disruption and hate between the sexes, more American tragedies.

My son's wife often described him as, "not having an anti-female bone in his body." Now that he has become the victim of a beat dad mom, a sadder but wiser he has very revised opinions of she.

I am hearing more anti-female sentiment. It is no longer jocular but serious when a man calls the nineteenth amendment a big mistake. After three quarters of a century of living and a life devoted to supporting feminine causes, I am inclined to agree.

Those of us living history are mostly unaware of the consequences of our actions however well intended. Will future historians say of America, "Of all sad words of tongue and pen, the saddest are these it might have been."
