Defense Posture

Dr. Lawrence J. Korb is Director of the Center for Public Policy Education and Senior Fellow in the Foreign Policy Studies Program at the Brookings Institution in Washington. He has had a distinguished career in government, academia and private business. From 1981 through 1985, Dr. Korb served as Assistant Secretary of Defense (Manpower, Reserve Affairs, Installations and logistics), where he administered about 70 percent of the defense budget. In 1985-86, he was Vice President, Corporate Operations for the Raytheon Corporation. He earned an MA degree from St. John's University and a PhD degree from the State University of New York at Albany. He has taught at the University of Dayton, the US Coast Guard Academy and the Naval War College. Dr. Korb is currently an Adjunct Professor at Georgetown University. He served four years on active duty as a naval flight officer and retired from the Naval Reserve with the rank of Captain. His many publications on national security issues include the books, The Joint Chiefs of Staff: the First Twenty-five Years and The Fall and Rise of the Pentagon.

Our Moderator, Rear Admiral Edward F. Welch, Jr., USN Ret, served three years as President of the Naval War College before retiring in 1982. During his active career, he held a number of important command and staff positions, including command of the submarine USS Odax and Submarine Division 42. He was Executive Officer of the submarine USS Grenadier when that ship was given the Admiral Wright Award for surfacing a Soviet Zulu-class submarine in the mid 50s. In Washington, he served in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, in the Office of the Secretary of Defense as Deputy Director for NATO Nuclear Planning and on the Joint Staff as Deputy Director for International Negotiations. He was also Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff, Plans and Policy at SHAPE under General Alexander Haig. He was directly involved in arms control negotiations for a number of years, serving by Presidential appointment as Deputy US Commissioner on the US-USSR Standing Commission in Geneva. He holds a BS degree from the US Naval Academy and an MA from Harvard. He is a graduate of The National War College and served later on the NWC Faculty.

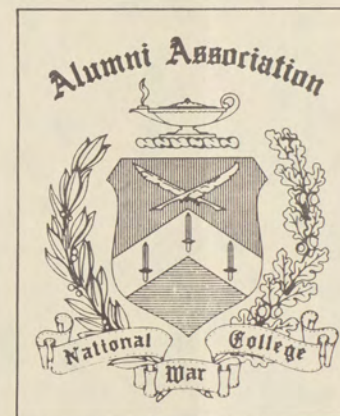

War College Update

Major General Gerald P. Stadler, USA reported in June 1989 as the 18th Commandant of The National War College, from an assignment as Deputy Commander of the US Eighth Army in Korea. He is a graduate of the US Military Academy, the Field Artillery School, the Army Command and General Staff College and The National War College. He also earned an MA degree in history at Duke University. MGEN Stadler has held a number of command and staff positions in Europe, Pakistan and Vietnam. In Washington, he served on the Army Staff and in the Studies and Analysis Gaming Agency of the Joint Staff. Subsequent duties included Commander of the 1st Cavalry Division Artillery, Chief of Staff and School Director of the Field Artillery Center and School at Ft Sill, Deputy Commanding General of the Army Training Center and School at Ft Leonard Wood and Commanding General of the III Corps Artillery at Ft Sill.

Central America

Dr. Mark B. Rosenberg has been the Director of the Latin American and Caribbean Center (LACC) at Florida International University in Miami since its founding in 1979. In less than a decade, LACC emerged as one of the leading centers for the study of that region. Faculty size tripled to over 75 and a number of LACC-associated scholars are recognized as leaders in their respective fields. During that period, Dr. Rosenberg raised over \$2 million in external funds to match FIU support. Acknowledging LACC's pre-eminence, the Latin American Studies Association asked him to chair its XV International Congress in Miami in 1989. The Congress had over 1500 registrants and 300 different scholarly sessions. Dr. Rosenberg is a 1971 Phi Beta Kappa graduate of Miami University (Ohio) and earned his PhD in political science at the University of Pittsburgh. He has been a member of the Department of Political Science at FIU since 1976.

Soviet Union and Eastern Europe

Dr. Richard E. Combs, Jr. has been serving as Advisor for Foreign Policy to the Senate Armed Services Committee since his retirement from the Senior Foreign Service in 1989. Prior to joining the Foreign Service in 1966, he received Russian language training at the Army Language School and then served three years as an intelligence specialist. He continued his Soviet and Eastern European specialization in the Foreign Service, including three assignments in

Moscow totalling eight years, most recently as Deputy Chief of Mission from 1985 to 1987. After attending the Senior Seminar at the Foreign Service Institute in Washington, he was detailed in 1988 to Congress as Senior Advisor for Soviet and Eastern European Affairs to the Commission for Security and Cooperation in Europe. He earned BA, MA and PhD degrees at the University of California at Berkeley. He holds the Foreign Service rank of Minister-Counselor (2-star equivalent).

LUNCHEON PROGRAM

Persian Gulf

Ambassador W. Nathaniel Howell is currently at the Department of State awaiting assignment. He had been serving as the US Ambassador to Kuwait from 1987 until forced out by the Iraqi invasion. In 1986-87, he was the Political Advisor (POLAD) to the Commander-in-Chief, US Central Command, headquartered at MacDill Air Force Base, Tampa, Florida. Entering the Foreign Service in 1965, he served overseas in Egypt, Paris, Brussels and Beirut, and as Deputy Chief of Mission in Algiers. His Washington assignments focussed on the Middle East. He earned BA and PhD degrees at the University of Virginia and taught there for a year before entering the Foreign Service. Dr. Howell is a 1983 graduate of The National War College, where he co-authored an award-winning essay on strategy. He has been awarded the State Department Superior Honor Award (1967), the Meritorious Honor Award (1976) and the Award for Valor (1977). He also received the Defense Department Distinguished Civilian Service Award (1988). He holds the Foreign Service rank of Minister-Counselor (2-star equivalent) and is fluent in Arabic and French.

AFTERNOON PROGRAM

Terrorism

Dr. David E. Long is Visiting Professor of International Relations at the US Coast Guard Academy, where he also served recently as Acting Head of the Humanities Department. He earned a BA degree at Davidson College, MA degrees at the University of North Carolina and the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and a PhD degree at George Washington University. Joining the Foreign Service in 1962, he served overseas in the Sudan, Morocco, Saudi Arabia and Jordan. In Washington, his assignments included Chief of the Near East Research Division, member of the Policy Planning Staff and Associate Director of the Office of Counter-terrorism. He has received a number of Meritorious Service Awards, a Superior Honor Award for contributions in countering terrorism and the Averell Harriman Award "for extraordinary contributions to diplomacy exemplifying intellectual courage and a zeal for creative accomplishment." He is the author or co-author of six books, including The Anatomy of Terrorism (1990).
