**C-SPAN VIEWERS GET NIGHTLY WINDOW ON CHANGES IN
SOVIET UNION**

Washington, D.C., April 28, 1992 -- "News 1" the half-hour nightly evening newscast from the Soviet Union can be seen by American viewers on the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network C-SPAN2. **The news program airs on C-SPAN, Monday - Thursday, 6:00 PM (ET); Tuesday - Saturday, 7:25 AM (ET) and Monday - Friday, at 8:00 PM (ET) on C-SPAN2.** C-SPAN is offering this window on the changes in Soviet life and Soviet news reporting through a satellite agreement with Georgetown University.

An English translator provides a simultaneous voiced interpretation of the dialogue, which includes sports and weather. The state run "News 1," formerly known as "Vremya" ("Time") underwent a major staff upheaval following the August 1991 coup events in the Soviet Union.

C-SPAN is currently available in 56 million households and C-SPAN2 in 27 million households nationwide and worldwide via satellite. C-SPAN is privately funded to serve the public by America's cable television companies.

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
