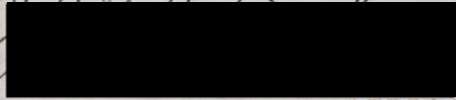
Contrary to the easy consensus of this panel, enlarging the Supreme Court does not require a constitutional amendment. The size of the court is not fixed in the judicial article of the U.S. Constitution, which reads:

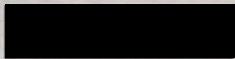
ARTICLE III

"The judicial Power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish."

While "falsus in uno, falsus in omnibus" may not apply, one's confidence in the wisdom of purported pundits who speak of large matters outside the ken of the listener is always a little less when they trip up on facts which the listener is knowledgeable about. It's like finding one definitely false charge in an otherwise unintelligible hospital bill.
