## Nelson Mandela Tours U.S. to Tell of Changes in South Africa

**S**OUTH African black nationalist leader **Nelson Mandela** travels to the United States this week to give the American people his view of the situation unfolding in his homeland. Several appearances by Mr. Mandela will air:

- A speech to the United Nations airs **Sunday, June 24**, at 5:30 pm ET/2:30 pm PT.
- An address to a joint meeting of Congress airs live **Tuesday, June 26**, at 11:00 am/

8:00 am PT. (The speech will re-air at 10:00 pm ET/7:00 pm PT that same day).

- A rally at Tiger Stadium in Detroit airs **Sunday, July 1**, at 5:00 pm ET/2:00 pm PT.

Mr. Mandela, deputy president of the African National Congress, has sought to overturn South Africa's system of apartheid. South African authorities released Mr. Mandela from prison in February after he served 27 years on charges of attempting to overthrow white rule.

In early June, South Afri-

can President **Frederik W. de Klerk** announced the end of a four-year state of national emergency, restoring ordinary law to all regions of the country except the strife-torn Natal province. Mr. Mandela called the lifting of the state of emergency "a victory for the people of South Africa as a whole, both black and white."

Mr. Mandela's 10-day tour also includes stops in Boston, Atlanta, Miami, and Los Angeles. ■

## Program Studies Federal Role of Washington, D.C.

**C**-SPAN will take a look at the relationship between the District of Columbia and the federal government in a special program airing June 26 and 27.

"We're hoping to give viewers an opportunity to understand the special status D.C. has as a federal district," said Eileen Quinn, C-SPAN's Capitol Hill producer.

Several aspects of the District's relationship with the federal government will be explored, including its financial ties.

A taped interview **Tuesday, June 26**, at 8:00 pm ET/5:00 pm PT, will give an historical overview of the capital city. At 8:30 pm ET/5:30 pm PT, during a taped roundtable discussion, guests will discuss the character of the city's neighborhoods and people.

Programming **Wednesday, June 27**, beginning at 6:30 pm ET/3:30 pm PT begins with two live call-ins on the debate over D.C. statehood.

## Live Call-ins From Tokyo Examine Life, Politics in Japan



The Japanese parliament's House of Representatives. Live call-ins from Tokyo this **Sunday, June 24**, at 9:30 pm ET/6:30 pm PT will examine life and politics in Japan.

**A** MERICANS who already know quite a bit about Panasonic televisions, Toyota cars, and Sony Walkmans will get a chance to learn more about Japan and its government this week when C-SPAN travels to Tokyo.

The C-SPAN telecast comes at a time when Japan and the United States are grappling to understand each other as well as the dynamics of their economic interdependence.

The network will air a live call-in from Japan with a high-ranking politician and two journalists **Sunday, June 24**, at 9:30 pm ET/6:30 pm PT. (In Tokyo, the time will be Monday, June 25, 10:30 am.)

The 90-minute call-in will begin with **Ishiro Ozawa**, the secretary general of the Liberal Democrat Party, the majority party in the Japanese Diet or parliament for the past 35 years.

Last year Mr. Ozawa, 47, was involved in coordinating the party line on economics, and has served as a deputy cabinet secretary and minister of autonomy, according to a spokesman from the Japanese Embassy.

Following that program, journalist **Yoshio Murikami** will discuss his job as foreign editor of *Asahi Shimbun* [which means Morning Sun (Continued on page 8)]

## C-SPAN Programming to Be Distributed to Japanese Audiences

C-SPAN has worked out an agreement with C-NET, a Japanese company, giving them exclusive rights to distribute C-SPAN programming in Japan.

C-NET, which stands for Congressional Network, is also working to get rights to broadcast the Japanese Con-

gress or Diet. If an agreement is reached for C-NET to air the Diet C-SPAN will then have exclusive rights to air C-NET's footage in the United States.

C-NET has hired Mariko Yamamura, a recent graduate of Georgetown University, to represent the company

in Washington. "I'll be choosing programs that we'll send back to Japan, the things we think Japanese will be interested in, such as trade and foreign policy issues," she said. In addition, she hopes to produce programs in the United States for C-NET.

"I think it is a very exciting, interesting job, to help the Japanese audience better understand the U.S. Congress," she said.

"C-NET is just like C-SPAN was 10 years ago," Ms. Yamamura said.

A native of Tokyo, Ms. Yamamura speaks fluent English and Japanese and some French. She graduated with a master's degree in international relations from the School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University.

She came to Georgetown after graduating from a uni-

versity in Japan with a degree in English and American Literature and working with the Sony Corporation.

Ms. Yamamura will travel with C-SPAN to Japan on June

21, to help the network with its programming from Tokyo. It will be the first time she has been home in more than a year. ■

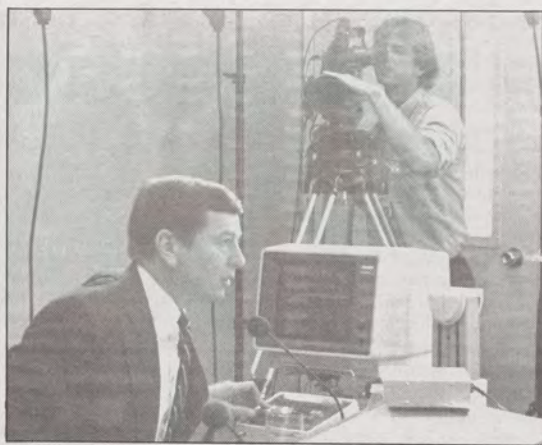

a roundtable discussion with members of the City Council will examine the council's role in governing the city. Footage from a City Council meeting will also be shown at this time.

Programming wraps up at 9:00 pm ET/6:00 pm PT with separate 45 minute roundtables examining the relationship between the District and the federal government.

The District receives an annual payment from Congress, in lieu of taxes on federal properties, to meet many of its operating costs.

Although the city has its own elected mayor [Mayor Marion Barry is currently on trial for alleged drug abuse and perjury], and city council, **Congress retains power to veto all legislation passed by the city council.**

The District also has its own school board and an elected, though non-voting delegate to Congress. D.C. Delegate Walter Fauntroy is now running for mayor and urging Mayor Barry not to run.

Rev. Jesse Jackson, who has recently become a resident of the District but is not running for any office, has pushed for

statehood, which would transform the District into the state of New Columbia.

C-SPAN's guests will include Julius Hobson, a former lobbyist for Washington D.C.; representatives from the Historical Society of Washington; Garland Pinkston, acting director of the Inter-governmental Relations Office, and Richard Clark, City Council staff member.

Congressmen who are members of committees that regularly deal with the district are also expected to participate. ■

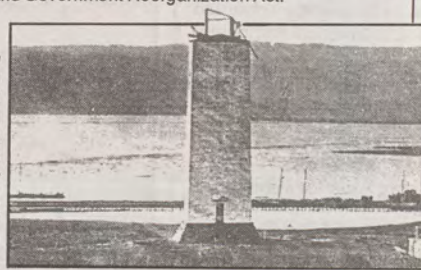

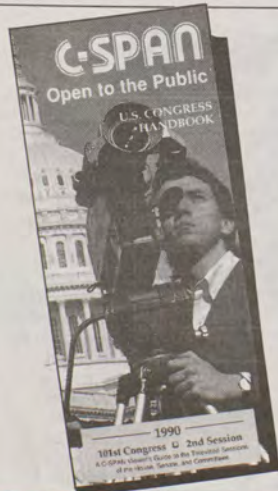

## ADA Looks for Revival of Liberalism in the '90s

THE "L" WORD is expected to make a comeback at this week's Americans for Democratic Action convention.

"We're going to come out full-square swinging defining what liberal means—not only is it all right to say it, it's essential," said Amy Isaacs, the national director of Americans for Democratic Action, a liberal political lobbying organization.

"Liberalism for the '90s," is the title of a panel discussion taking place at this week's ADA convention in Washington. C-SPAN will air highlights, including the panel discussion, Sunday, June 24, at 1:00 pm ET/10:00 am PT.

Panelists will include Jim Hightower, Texas' commissioner of agriculture; Maxine Waters, a California state senator; and Bob Kutner, an economist and political commentator, and editor of *American Prospect*, a new liberal journal. Patsy Mink, president of the Hawaiian chapter of ADA, will moderate the discussion.

During the convention, Ms. Isaacs noted, the ADA hopes to reinforce its roots. "It's time for liberals to re-seize the ini-

tiative," she said. "For the past eight to 10 years we've been reacting to the excesses of the Reagan and Bush administrations. A lot of what we have been saying is 'no.' We're going back to what has been our traditional role—saying 'yes.' We want to be on the cutting edge."

"The downplay [of the word liberal] began in 1976,

when Mo Udall [Democratic congressman from Arizona] began calling himself a progressive," Ms. Isaacs explained.

"I think what it means is a deep and abiding belief that government can be good and has a responsibility to the citizens of the nation," Ms. Isaacs said. "The overriding concern of that government

should be to prevent the waste of our most precious resource, which is our human capital."

"We're perceived by conservatives as ultra-radical liberals. We're not," she said.

Founded in 1947, the ADA now includes 100,000 dues-paying members.

Between 200 and 300 are expected at this year's convention, which has a theme

titled "Rethinking National Security."

"There's been too much talk of national security simply as military spending," Ms. Isaacs said. "What it really is, is reasonable and responsible to... human needs—housing, health care—we're talking about America's security as well." ■

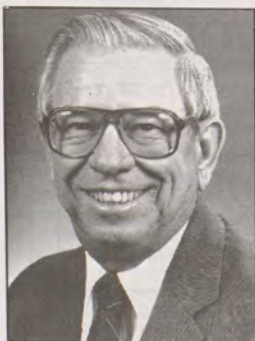
## Secretary Lujan Describes Plan For Controlling Oil Exploration

OIL EXPLORATION off the U.S. coastline continues to be a hotly contested issue between oil companies and environmental groups, and the Interior Department is stepping in to settle the debate.

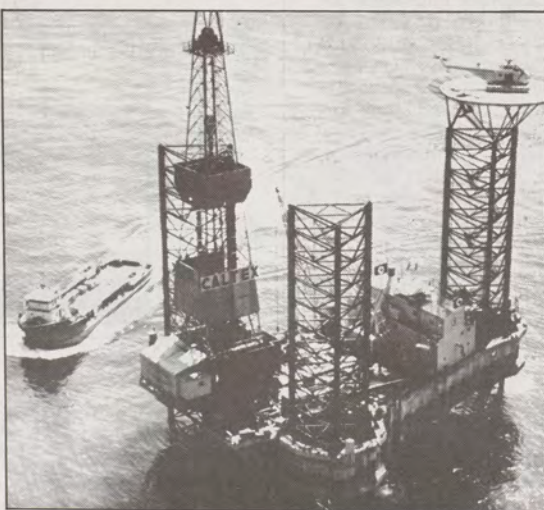
Oil companies claim offshore oil deposits will help ensure America's energy future.

Environmentalists counter that the risk of damaging fragile marine ecosystems isn't worth extracting the oil.

Interior Secretary Manuel



U.S. Interior Secretary **Manuel Lujan** will discuss the Bush administration's proposal for regulating off-shore oil drilling. His speech airs Saturday, June 30, at 10:30 pm ET.



Lujan will outline the government's plan for allowing additional exploration and drilling along the nation's shores when he speaks at the National Press Club in Washington, D.C., this week, an Interior Department spokesman said.

Secretary Lujan will also describe areas that may be isolated as marine sanctuaries restricted from oil exploration, the spokesman said. Likely spots are Florida and

California. C-SPAN will air the secretary's speech Saturday, June 30, at 10:30 pm ET/7:30 pm PT.

Secretary Lujan also plans to address the Endangered Species Act and his desire to raise franchise fees for concessionaires in the national parks. Concessionaires do everything from selling food to renting mules that carry visitors into the Grand Canyon. ■

### What's C-SPAN?

C-SPAN, the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network, is a non-profit cooperative of the cable-television industry.

The network's on-air debut in 1979 coincided with the inauguration of live telecasts from the floor of the House of Representatives. At that time, C-SPAN's programming consisted solely of live, gavel-to-gavel telecasts of House proceedings, and its potential audience comprised 3.5 million households. Today, C-SPAN's programming is available in more than 50 million cable television households via 3,764 affiliated cable systems.

The core of C-SPAN's programming continues to be live, unedited telecasts of the House. These proceedings, however, account for only one-tenth of the network's schedule.

## Time Correspondent Describes Soviet Youth

**M**OST OF WHAT Americans read in the newspapers about the Soviet Union concerns such issues as superpower summits dealing with arms control.

Rarely does the American public read about young Soviets' problems with dating, drugs, or careers.

Time magazine's former Moscow correspondent Nancy Traver, who now reports on congressional issues for the magazine, has written a book about the effects of *glasnost* and *perestroika* on Soviet youth.

Ms. Traver will discuss her new book in a C-SPAN call-in Monday, June 25, at 8:45 am ET/5:45 am PT. The book is titled "Kife: The Lives and Dreams of Soviet Youth."

The young people "hungry for *kife*, an all-encompassing slang word that involves a robust zest for life,"

the book explains. Ms. Traver met and interviewed many Soviet teen-agers—from soldiers to rock musicians—during her four years as a Moscow correspondent.

In her book, she tells how she turned to reporting about Soviet youth: "Soviet statesmen who were authorized to speak had little use for a woman reporter in her 20s. So I directed my attention toward other segments of Soviet society."

Ms. Traver tries to define *kife* in the book, and relates this story about the different meanings of the word:

"*Kife* is the centerpiece of many Soviet jokes, but one well-known tale is particularly apt in its illustration of the word. In the joke, three young men are locked in conversation, trying to define *kife*. One of them says, '*Kife* is when you wake up in the morning

with a terrible hangover. You go to the kitchen and find a cold beer there waiting for you. That is *kife*."

"The second man says, '*Kife* is when you come home and find 200 rubles on the kitchen table and a note from your wife that says 'Gone on a business trip. See you in two weeks.' That is *kife*."

"The third man says, '*Kife* is when you hear a knock on the door in the middle of the night, you open it and a KGB agent says, 'Is this apartment 23?' And you have the pleasure of saying, 'No, this is apartment 25. Now that, my friends, is *kife*!'" ■

## Bronx Congressman Discusses New Role

**R**EP. JOSE SERRANO describes his role representing the 18th District of New York as "part-time social worker, part-time rabbi, part-time reverend."

"It's more than just being a good legislator," he said during a recent C-SPAN interview.

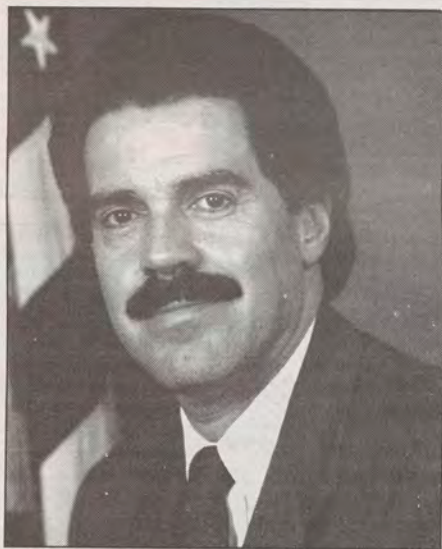
Rep. Serrano discusses his first months on the job and his agenda for the future during a special "Capital Agenda" interview this Sunday, June 24, at 6:30 pm ET/3:30 pm PT and 12:30 am ET/9:30 pm PT.

Sworn in on the 38th anniversary of his parents' arrival in the United States from Puerto Rico, Rep. Serrano represents the 18th District of New York, which includes the Bronx. He replaced Rep.

Robert Garcia (D-N.Y.), who resigned his seat after being convicted on charges that he accepted bribes from Wedtech, a military contractor located in the Bronx.

Throughout the interview Rep. Serrano discusses the problems facing his district, which the 1980 census showed was the poorest in the nation.

"Everything that has gone wrong in American society can be found in my district, from crack-addicted babies, to babies born with AIDS, the homeless issue, migrants and immigrants...a dropout rate among black and Puerto Rican children, who make up about 99 percent of the district, of anywhere from 45 to 72 percent. Certainly the kind of district that can make you

angry, because you know you're living in the greatest country on Earth, you know you're still living in the wealthiest country on Earth, you know you're still living

in a country that can spend \$855 million on one airplane, and yet that money can go to build a lot of housing and educate a lot of children." ■

## Phillips Foresees Coming 'New Deal' Era

**P**OLITICAL ANALYST Kevin Phillips foresees another New Deal or Progressive Era following the "heydays" of the Reagan era.

Mr. Phillips outlines his predictions in his new book, "The Politics of Rich and Poor: Wealth and the American Electorate in the Reagan Aftermath," published by Random House.

Mr. Phillips is this week's guest on "Booknotes," C-SPAN's weekly author-interview program, which airs Sunday, June 24, at 8:00 pm ET/5:00 pm PT. The program is re-aired the same day at 11:00 pm ET/8:00 pm PT.

The author compares the years that President Reagan held office to two previous Republican heydays—the 1920s and the Gilded Age of the late 19th century.

Each time, Republican administrations presided over boom cycles promoting less regulation, high interest rates, and low taxes, periods in which the rich got richer on a crest of debt and speculation, Mr. Phillips points out.

And each time, the downside that followed was similar: collapsing farmland values, decay of older industries, and a recurrent increase in homelessness, resulting in the

Progressive Era and the New Deal, the author notes.

"Only for so long will strung-out \$35,000-a-year families enjoy magazine articles about the hundred most successful businessmen in Dallas or television programs about the life-styles of the rich and famous," Mr. Phillips writes in his introduction.

The author is a commentator for National Public Radio and CBS Radio Network. He served as commentator for CBS at the '84 and '88 presidential conventions. He also wrote "The Emerging Republican Majority" in 1967. ■

## How Well Does the Media Cover Congress?

Tim Cook, author of "Making Laws, Making News," discussed local TV news coverage of Congress and congressional use of the local media.



### News and the Legislative Process

"THE OLD STORY is there are two types of legislators—the hard working workhorse and the flashy, media-conscious, show horse, and never the twain shall meet. I'm suggesting that making laws may not be counterproductive to making news nor vice versa, that the two may be quite closely linked.... Making news is one way to draw attention to particular issues, to build particular coalitions.... Gaining media attention is part of the legislative process."

### National vs. Local Media Coverage

"I THINK THE big national papers that are available at every airport in the country—USA Today, the New York Times, the Wall Street Journal—do a good job at skimming the surface, touching on the bottom line, recording, for the record, what the big votes are. They do a terrible job of covering what every individual member does. [As a regional or local reporter.] I don't think by and large that we do as good a job as we could. So, an 'A' for the nationals and a 'B-minus' for the locals."

Tom Ackerman, Washington correspondent for King Broadcasting, examined the structure of the congressional press corps.



### Reporting the Process

"HOW DO YOU explain parliamentary votes? Frankly I think that most of the audience isn't interested in hearing an explanation of process. I think that is, professionally, one of our biggest frustrations, trying to explain to the extent that the audience's tolerance will allow it, how process dictates what happens to a piece of legislation. In television... it is even more difficult. It's really left to the audience, the devoted viewers of C-SPAN to pick up the threads."
