Grant b. Apr. 27, 1822 (63)
d. July 23, 1885
1885 - Two Volumes
published

his companies had gone

Sam Grant / Ferdinand Ward / Buck Grant

Ward took them to bankruptcy -

He worshiped money ^{Grant and Ward - most successful}
^{financial firm in U.S. history.}

James Fish of Marine Bank
and US Grant added to firm

Friends built 3 homes for Elbert - Galena / New York / D.C.

May 4, 1884 - Ward came to visit - Ward needed \$50,000
Grant borrows from Henry Vanderbilt. - Ward needed \$600,000

Elkins (a lawyer) and Buck went to see Ward - kept them
waiting for 5 hours - had his "slipper" on - They wanted a check
for \$400,000. Said he'd have it in the morning.
Banks close their doors. Mob gathers - Ward flees -

Grant "I don't see how I can trust any human being again".
Twain worshiped Grant - first met 1866 - 10 years later.

Took Grant apart Palmer House dinner - late Oct 81
had conversation in NYC with Grant about writing
his bio at first - late May 5, 1884 when he went bankrupt
Started re-thinking - sell his home in Galena / Phillip's farm
in Mo. and his personal memorabilia - Vanderbilt didn't offer
\$150,000 - Grant wanted his honor. / Grant took money offered
by veterans and friends.
Both Grant and Twain believed it was men of money who ruled world
Between May 1884 (bankruptcy) and July 1885 (death) Twain and
Grant would become best friends

Chap 1 - despised slavery - had 6 children

Unconditional surrender for Simon Buckner Bolivar P 29

Chap 2. 6 children Twain

Railroad pilot - trip to New Orleans

Brother killed
Confederate soldier in 1861 - got out
went to Nevada - 6 months silver prospector
became journalist in Virginia City

Feb 3, 1863 - became Mark Twain

Went to Calif., Hawaii, New York, then the Midwest
became a humorist

Travelled on Quaker City to Europe / Jerusalem

Wrote The Innocents Abroad / Longfellow / The Gilded Age

Chap 2 -

Jumping Frog - moves to Hartford
1868 - met Livy - wanted him to stop drinking / no cigar
Olivia born / Son dies

Quarry Farm

Hartford home - 6 servants 19 rooms

1874 - begin work on Tom Sawyer. It was not a success
met and befriended John T. Lewis, a black man
neighbor in Hartford with Harriet Beecher Stowe
Henry Ward Beecher - Plymouth Church in Brooklyn
trial for alleged adulterous affair - bankrupted his church
Twain - "human being is a stupidly constituted machine" p 50
After Tilton/Beecher trial in 1876 began Huck Finn
Wrote 16 chapters - put it away until 1884.

In June 84' Grant and family in Long Branch, N.J.
Philip Dug. pub. George Cluett's boy's cottage for Grant

28 rooms
84' - money a problem - thought he should write memoirs
Century Mag. asked Grant to write 4 articles
Slavery / Victoria / Wilderness / Lee's surrender

Chap 4 continued -

In Huck Finn - very similar to Grant's trip down
Miss. - Grant tried at Victoria 8 times - Huck
and Jim came ashore 8 times before Jim freed.
Crossed the entire Miss - back to Hartford then to

Quarry Farm - finished book on Miss - 1882

Summer of 83' back to Huck

Livy read the manuscript - vulgar words
Geo. Cluett recommended to Grant he take Twain's
20% of gross sales - would be largest
full paid for author \$420,000
Didn't take \$16,000 advance -
Publishing all about money P 120

Chap 3 - Dr. John Hancock Douglas P 65
Oct 20 (?) 1884 - diagnosed - throat cancer
Modest deal with Century for memoir - 10%
royalty

3 pages a day

Son Fred - editor - best friend

General Grant is doomed - die within a year

Adam Baden - 3 volume History of War

Grant wanted wanted his help. - He was writing
a novel and didn't want to be disturbed

Fred and Baden acted as editors -

Grant worked in small room at 66th house
from early morning to evening

Harrison Egglestyn - black servant, confidant
did with anything

Used street car to go to the doctors until Baden
insisted he take carriage.

Twain stops by in Nov. -

* Grant told stories Twain told tales
How he convinced Grant to let him publish P 82

Twain - overheard two men talking about Grant's memoir
on the New York street -

Went to Grant offered him double Century price
\$50,000

Suggested he sell through subscription
pay him 20% (instead of 10%) or 15% of profits
took Twain 9 years to finish Huck Finn.

Whitelaw Reid - New York Tribune - didn't
like Twain - he set out to get revenge and
wrote a critical bio on him.

- Left New York for St. Louis and has this trip
on Apr 17, 1882

Boat to New Orleans - lots of poverty - still fighting
the war - stopped where brother was buried and
died on Pennsylvania

plagued Twain until 1883

Trip down Mississippi to see Grant's victory spots.

Search for wealth, illusions -

3 daughters busy place and jeans

(2 months tour of Europe - Nurses at one
time for his children

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chap 1

Grant on God - worked on Sunday P179

never doubted in public existence of God.

religion he thought was becoming a major industry
never baptised

Rev. John Phillip Newman - took credit for saving
Grant. - Told reporter

Twain - public display meant Lucifer not
God was being loosed on the World.

Put up with Newman for Julia

Senator Jerome Chafetz - not cancer after all
Garfield and doctors

Grant's cancer spread to lungs / jaw

"the silent men" - doctors didn't want to talk

Cocaine

B- day / 63rd / Apr. 27 - ride in Central Park

Badeau has falling out with Grant

World accuses Grant of leaving Ghostwriters

Twain wants to real

* Badeau's letters to Grant P198

wants more money

Grant's letter to Badeau calls him petulant

Aug 6 - Grant slowly dying from cancer

Deaths watch outside his 66th st. home

Julia thought work on memoir made him weaker
people stayed

Old friends come to visit John Fremont -

Sons of R.E. Lee and Albert Sidney Johnson

Daughters Nellie / Gen. John Blackjacket Logan
had her writers check for ~~for facts~~ for article in Century
Sherman tried to get a bill passed for Grant pension
at last minute House and Senate pass pension bill.
time clock books

\$13,500 a year - after death Julia \$5,000

Grant's doctors John Douglas / Foydye Barker / George
Month March -
He finished Vicksburg article - dictated ^{shady} it

wrote as many as 10,000 words in one day
For Twain - not happy with money being paid for

Century mag article - worried about rights

Sutliff / Vicksburg / Chattanooga / Wilderness
Smith said Grant owned title to article

March 20 Karl Gerhardt went with Twain to Grant's home
He brought a clay bust from photo - Julia loved it.

He started sculpting in person - best likeness ever.

March 25 - ~~chocking~~ Choking fit - violent

March 31 - thought he would die but didn't

Twain remained silent on Grant's work - wouldn't
comment on it to Grant - Eventually he compared
it to Caesar's Commentaries - Grant liked that.

"most important work of non-fiction in
our literature" author P235

Julia died 1904.

Became good friend of Mrs. Varina Davis - wife of J. D.
12 grand children

Chap 8

* Grant on Slavery and how it relates to Twain p218
Grant moves to N.Y. M'Gregor 12 miles outside
of Saratoga - and to die.

Twain - not part of funeral -

Notice - written for Huck Finn. P232

Chap 5 - Grant is sick

Newspaper begin to report - In NYC at 66th
no visitors - except Sherman stops by

Grant's 3 greatest worries

① having to retrace his steps ② having to ask
for money ③ being unable to care for Julia

William T. Sherman - became fast friends after Shiloh

Sherman counseled Grant to stay out of politics

"one class of men makes war and leaves another
to fight it out."

Sherman tried to put Grant back on active Army list
so he could get a Pension - Senate passed it
Senate vetoed it on a technicality - House refused
to take up bill -

Twain - wasn't aware of illness - he was on

Twin of Genius Tour - with George Washington
Cable

went 10 cities - played to packed houses

Cable more popular than Twain.

Charles L. Webster and Co. to publish memoirs
Reviews on Huck were mixed - Boston Herald
didn't like what he had said about P146
Emerson / Holmes / Longfellow
