Letter to the Editor

There is so much focus on "gloom and doom" within the world that it appears to overshadow major efforts reducing the production nuclear weapons: (1) The Clinton Administration has influenced both Japan and North Korea to consider converting their nuclear power reactors to types less proliferation prone; (2) Most other countries, including the United States, have largely dropped plans to use plutonium as a fuel because natural uranium is much cheaper and safer; (3) Congressman Lee Hamilton, Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee has proposed a worldwide ban on the production of fissile materials for weapons purposes.

Dear Congressman Hamilton:

The substance of your letter dated August 12, 1993 is a benchmark in designing a global strategy for production of nuclear energies. The underpinning of a global plan should reflect Energy Secretary O'Leary's insight, pertaining to the disposal of waste, that the solution involve interfacing military and civilian efforts. Such an overhaul to the present system could be the groundwork for other nations to reform their programs, i.e., superstring.

The "downshift" banning the production of fissile material for weapons purposes may be the saving grace to boost non-proliferation efforts. Systemically, reallocating deep-space resources to inner-space research (super-collider) would draw a clearer picture of the interrelationship between science and religion.

I deeply appreciate the opportunity of building a dialogue of ideas with you, Lee. Thank you very much for your recent letter. I read it carefully, and I appreciate your taking the time to bring your views to my attention.

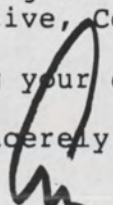
I share your concern about plutonium and nuclear power reactors. Your suggestion that nuclear power reactors be converted to types less proliferation-prone is exactly what the U.S. is currently suggesting to North Korea in addition to insisting that North Korea cooperates with the IAEA and South Korea on inspections of nuclear facilities.

Your other recommendations that the U.S. should be pursuing a global treaty addressing the production and disposal of plutonium is one that I have made to the Clinton administration. I have proposed a worldwide ban on the production of fissile material for weapons purposes because I feel that it would significantly boost nonproliferation efforts.

I also noted your comments regarding domestic issues. I have passed your views on to your representative, Congressman McCloskey.

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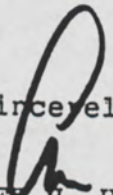
