line a Democratic caller.

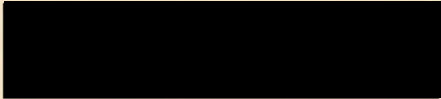
For a long time I accepted

ship.

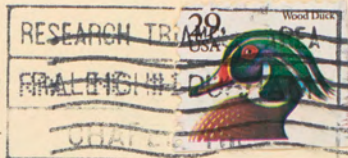
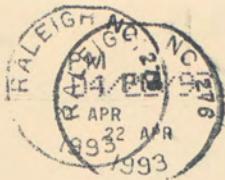
I am old and house-
