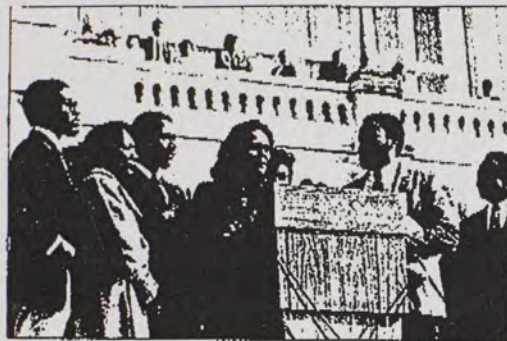

A New Coalition of Conscience for Jobs, Justice and Peace



On Capitol Steps, King, family, and other supporters of King Holiday Bill celebrated after the bill was signed at the White House. Mrs. King thanked supporters, flanked by nephew Isaac Farris, Jr.; Dr. King's sister, Mrs. Christine Farris; son, Dexter; son, Martin, III, and SCLC Chairman, Congressman Walter Fauntroy.

## A Message from Mrs. King

August 28, 1963 was a watershed day in U.S. history and a landmark in world history. On that day, more than 250,000 people gathered in Washington, D.C., to protest racism, violence and poverty and to demand jobs and freedom.

The March on Washington brought together a great new "Coalition of Conscience." Civil Rights, labor, religious and student organizations locked arms together to announce to the nation that segregation, Jim Crowism, violence and racism must be brought to an end and that jobs and freedom must be the priority.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. electrified the world with his "I Have a Dream" speech, where he called on the nation to honor its promises and commitments as written in the Constitution. Three major pieces of legislation emerged as result of that struggle and became the cornerstone which socially transformed American society over the

ensuing thirty years. They were the Voting Rights Act of 1965, the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Fair Housing Act.

That day in August 1963 also inspired Native Americans, Hispanics, Women and disabled Americans to use the Coalition of Conscience as a model to gain those rights that had been denied them.

In 1963 the issues were clear and visible. Thirty years later, the issues are not as visible or as clear cut to most Americans. As a result many have been lulled to sleep, assuming that all is well.

The thirtieth anniversary of the historic March on Washington at the Lincoln Memorial on August 28, 1993, affords us an opportunity for reconciliation, for working together for the dream for all Americans, and for struggling until we all stand together and shout, "Free at last, free at last, thank God almighty, we're free at last."

### "Marches are not one day affairs"

Great marches are not one day affairs. They become etched in the fabric of history because of what those who march do *before* they march and *after* the march.

It is our hope and our expectation that those of us who march and those of us who support

We are determined to make the 30th Anniversary Mobilization of the March on Washington renowned for what we in this day and this generation will have done to bring about changes to produce Jobs, Justice and Peace 1993, 1994 and 1995.

This page in the 30th Anniversary March Newsletter each month will Alert those who are serious about Jobs, Justice and Peace as to what action on our specific legislative agenda is scheduled to be taken each month, and what we must do that month to press our case with those members of Congress for whom we vote or the President on any of the ten to twelve bills that are the object of our march.

In the next issue of our newsletter, we shall detail those specific legislative priorities that will give content to our demand for Jobs, Justice and Peace, and pinpoint those that are at stages of consideration that require that people who support the goals of the March contact their members of Congress. He ready to respond. For as I said at the outset: MARCHES ARE NOT ONE-DAY AFFAIRS. This March, like the ones in 1963 and 1968, is destined to be Great, not just because we march on August 28, 1993, but because we who support this March are equally as committed to contacting those whom we elect to set policy, to see to it that they vote for the specific bills that are the goals of our March.

## Jobs, Justice And Peace: A Call to the Nation

Today our country is emerging from a dark tunnel of neglect and systematic indifference toward basic human needs. We seek to recapture the power for good which we achieved through Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s movement for nonviolent social change. Yet, three pervasive conditions still demonstrate America's continuing inhumanity to Americans:

- a horrifying lack of JOBS which families and individuals need in order to feed, shelter, and dignify themselves;
- an absence of JUSTICE in policies and resource allocations affective many people, communities and our environment, as well as INJUSTICES because of race, gender, age, sexual orientation, mental and physical disabilities, religion, and poverty; and,

We PASS THE TORCH OF LEADERSHIP TO YOUTH, as they, too, join as full partners in this March for JOBS, JUSTICE and PEACE. We call on all people of good will of every race, creed color and national origin, to JOIN THE 30th Anniversary March on Washington.

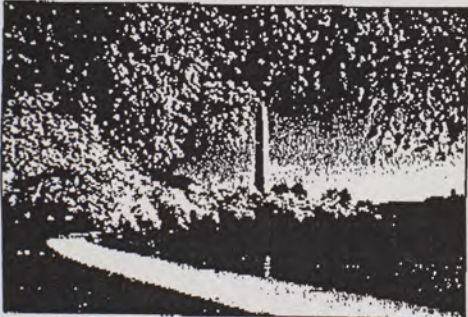

## Background

Thirty years ago, on August 28, 1963, more than 250,000 people gathered in Washington, D.C. to protest racism, violence and poverty, and to demand jobs and freedom. It was an historic event that became a classic example of the First Amendment right of every citizen of our democracy to "peaceably assemble to petition the government for redress of grievances."

Millions of citizens in our nation, black, white, red, brown and yellow, shared a common grievance that bound them in a nonviolent "Coalition of Conscience" for change in public policy, and the need to end racial segregation and discrimination by law in our country against people of African descent.

The condition of black people at that time was alarming. Blacks were held in inferior positions by whites, and were not welcomed in the white neighborhoods. Most earned half the income as whites and lived in poor and substandard conditions. There was economic discrimination in both wages earned and opportunities.

The oppressive state in which blacks found themselves is clearly detailed in the book by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. entitled, "Where Do We Go From Here: Chaos or Community? In that book, he gives insight into the hostility and violence within black communities.

Those who traveled to Washington, D.C. to participate in the March on that August 28, 1963 were indeed heard by the law makers on Capitol Hill. As a result, Congress passed and the President signed both the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

The power of people coming together as ONE VOICE was once again heard in 1983, when on August 27th, nearly a half a million people of every race, creed and color came together to commemorate the 20th Anniversary of the March on Washington and, to be heard as one voice for Jobs, Peace, and Freedom. That massive non-violent demonstration resulted in legislation that was signed into law, imposing Sanctions on South Africa, and establishing a National Holiday in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

In 1993, there is an urgent need for the "New Coalition of Conscience" to mobilize for action. The 30th Anniversary March on Washington summons people of conscience of every race, creed and ethnic origin to address the ever deepening cries for Jobs, Justice and Peace in our nation TODAY. A specific agenda has been defined, and a demand for particular legislation is being made by the New Coalition of Conscience.

## WHY WE MARCH...

We march for **JOBS**, to be heard as one voice for the **participation** of all our people in the opportunities and responsibilities that America has to offer, because 7 million people were out of work last month and hundreds of thousands more are being laid off each month. **Who is next?**

We march for **JUSTICE**, to speak with one voice calling upon America to value and to enhance our **diversity** - our strength and competitive advantage, because there is still discrimination on the basis of Race, ethnic origin, gender, age and sexual orientation. **We will not be divided!**

We march for **PEACE**, because there is no peace in our neighborhoods; 6000 killed on the streets in drug driven violence this year and serious crime is up to 6000 per 100,000 population in our country. There is no peace in the world; 18 million people in the world are now refugees because of wars and the wars in Eastern Europe, the Middle East, Africa, and Latin America continue to destroy vital human resources.

We march therefore, to speak with one voice - calling for **investment** in all of our people, including the talented among us who are left out: the young who can be educated and trained to be productive; the adults who can be retrained to be competitive in the global economy; and the elderly and disabled who still have much to offer us.

## Legislative Demands For Jobs

**H.R. 2010 and S.919 National Service Trust Act of 1993** (*Matthew G. Martinez D-CA and Edward Kennedy D-MA*) Companion bills to amend the National and Community Service Act of 1990 to establish a Corporation for national service, and provide national service educational awards to persons participating in such service, and for other purposes.

*Note: As we go to press, H.R. 2010 is scheduled for a vote in the House of Representatives. If as expected, this bill is approved by the House of Representatives, it will then move to the Senate for consideration. We urge people to contact their Senators to make sure that they will vote for this bill which could come to the Senate floor prior to the August recess. The Senate companion bill is S.919 and the sponsor is Senator Edward Kennedy D-MA.*

**Jobs Stimulus and Investment Appropriations** to provide \$16.3 billion as originally requested by the President in H.R. 1335 for investment in infrastructure; jobs and human resources, community, urban and rural development; and energy, environment and technology programs.

**S.861-S866 The Urban-Community Building Initiative** (*Bill Bradley D-NJ*) A package of legislation to give urban residents new tools to improve work skills, infrastructure, safety, family life, access to capital and jobs, and opportunity to save and invest.

**Head Start Full funding** for an expanded, high quality Head Start Program, with an increase of no less than \$800 million next year.

**H.R. 581 The Local Partnership Act of 1993.** (*John Conyers D-MI*) A bill to authorize \$3 billion in payments to units of general local government for fiscal years 1993 and 1994, establishing a revenue sharing program to local governments to re-hire unemployed workers, restore services, or expand programs on education, public safety, health, social services such as emergency food and shelter, and programs mandated by the Federal government such as the Water Pollution Control Act, the Americans With Disabilities Act, and public works projects.

**H.R. 5 and S. 55 - The Cesar Chavez Workplace Fairness Bill** (*William Clay D-Mo and Howard M. Metzenbaum D-Ohio*) Companion bills to ban the practice of permanently replacing striking workers when they demand better working conditions, better pay and benefits.

**H.R. 1280 and S.575 - Comprehensive Occupational Safety and Health Reform Act** (*William D. Ford D-MI and Edward M. Kennedy D-Mass.*) Companion bills to reform the Occupational Safety and Health Act to create safer workplaces and to give workers a voice in safety and health issues.

## Legislative Demands For Justice

**Health Care Reform** - A single legislative package offering comprehensive, affordable universal, coverage that contains provisions for long term care and assistance for the purchase of prescription drugs, health education and preventive care, mental health initiatives, and prenatal, infant and child care including immunization of children against preventable diseases.

**H.R. 2105 Environmental Justice Act of 1992** (*John Lewis D-GA*) A bill to establish a program to assure nondiscriminatory compliance with all environmental, health and safety laws and to assure equal protection of the public health.

**H.R. 51 New Columbia Admission Act** (*Eleanor Holmes Norton D-DC*) A bill to provide for the admission of the State of New Columbia into the Union.

**H.R. 1933 King Holiday and Service** (*John Lewis D-GA*) A bill to authorize appropriations for the Martin Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission, extend such Commission, establish a National Service Day to promote community service, and other purposes.

**S.1021** (*Daniel Inouye D-Hawaii*) A bill to assure religious freedom to Native Americans.

## Legislative Demands for Peace

**S.850 The National Economic Adjustment and Conversion Information Act-** (*Barbara Boxer D-CA*) A bill to establish the Office of Economic Conversion Information within the Department of Commerce and for other purposes.

**Legislation to establish an Enterprise fund for a democratic South Africa** to provide equity investments, loans, grants, feasibility studies, education and training to enable Black South Africans to participate effectively in economic recovery in post apartheid South Africa. This legislation is a prototype for the initiatives that must be taken to assure that private and public resources flow, not only West/East but also North/South to assure democratization, national reconciliation, economic development come to fruition in the developing nations.

**S.892 The Public Health and Safety Act of 1993** (*John R. Chafee R-R.I.*) A bill to prohibit the manufacture, importation, exportation, sale, purchase, transfer, receipt, possession or transportation of handguns and handgun ammunition with certain exceptions.

Washington, D.C., August 24, 1993 -- C-SPAN, the Cable Satellite Public Affairs Network, will be live from the *30th Anniversary March on Washington for Jobs, Justice & Peace*, on **Saturday, August 28, from 2:00 PM to approximately 5:00 PM (ET).**
