Advocates believe temporary vows would appeal to college-age women as a flexible career move, rather than an ironclad promise.

Also, such vows might help to ease the looming vocations crisis.

From 1990 to 1991, for example, the number of U.S. sisters has declined 2.5 percent (101,911 to 99,337) according to *The Official Catholic Directory*.

Since 1966, the number has dropped 45 percent (from 182,000, or a loss of 82,663 sisters).

"In today's society, people look at religious life and say 'I don't want to commit myself to that for-

bers who have made the commitment for life," Aspenleiter says. "The community needs that in order to thrive."

Today's sisters profess what are known as simple vows. These are dictated by canon law, the Catholic church's basic collection of standards and rules.

However, each order has the authority to write its own constitution — a document that specifies the group's philosophy, organization and guidelines for action.

Temporary vows would have to be added to the constitution if an order were to adopt them. And no one is sure how the Vatican would react to such a change.

Former wife sues contributor, GOP

He gave party \$400,000; she wants \$101,600 in back child support

LOS ANGELES — Three Republican Party committees and a Japanese businessman who contributed \$400,000 to the GOP were sued Friday for more than \$100,000 in child support the businessman allegedly owes an ex-wife.

The donation by Michael Kojima, which won him a seat with President Bush at a fund-raiser, came under scrutiny after Kojima's creditors complained.

Kojima reportedly owes more than \$1 million to ex-associates.

The District Attorney's Bureau of Family Support Operations sued to retrieve money from the campaign donation on behalf of Chong Cha Kojima, former wife of the businessman and mother of two of his children.

The lawsuit said that when the Kojimas were divorced in January 1984, a court ordered him to pay \$350 per child or \$700 per month to his former wife, but no payments have been received. It said he owes his ex-wife \$70,700 plus interest, a total of more than \$101,600.

Named as plaintiffs in the law-

suit were the 1992 Republican Senate House Dinner Committee, the National Republican Congressional Committee, the National Republican Senatorial Committee, Kojima, and his company, International Marketing Bureau Ltd.

The lawsuit asked the court to declare the \$400,000 the property of Michael Kojima, then order it turned over to Chong Cha Kojima. It said the back child support should be paid to her immediately and the rest held in trust to satisfy future child support payments.

The Kojima children are Emily,

12, and Elisha, 11.

Republican Party officials have placed the \$400,000 in escrow pending court actions. Wayne Doss, director of the Bureau of Family Support Operations, said the Republican Party also is contemplating legal action to distribute the money to Kojima's creditors.

Another former wife, Soon Kojima, said she and her two sons had given up searching for Kojima until he showed up at the dinner. She said he also owes back support for those two children.
