QUESTION: (From Sen. Strom Thurmond)

This year, the Senate began televising its proceedings. That leaves the federal courts as the only branch of government that the American people cannot see at work. Chief Justice Burger has adamantly opposed television and radio coverage of the oral arguments before the Court. Justice Rehnquist indicated last week that he was in favor of TV if it could be introduced in an unobtrusive way. What are your views?

If confirmed, I would of course want to consult my colleagues on this matter but would be inclined to agree with Justice Rehnquist. As Chairman of the Administrative Conference, I recommended the televising of important open agency proceedings to the extent there was an audience for them. (ACUS Recommendation 72-1)
